Tralee, Jan. 21. At present a most violent
Flux and Fever rage among the lower order of
the inhabitants, of this town and its vicinity.
Numbers have already fallen victims to these
maladies, and many more are now sinking un-
der their weight.

Last week, was transmitted to our county
gaol, by George Twiss, Esq; Daniel Brown,
charged with horse stealing. This fellow was,
we understand, a principal in a gang of thieves
that infested the borders of the counties of
Cork, Kerry, and Limerick. He was taken
on a warrant of George Gun, Esq's. by a
party of the Newmarket Rangers, between
Newmarket and Lisearroll, and conducted by
a large party of that corps, commanded by
Captain Stannard, to Mr. Twiss's, who ob-
ligingly prevented the gentlemen's taking the
trouble of conveying him further.
