We are assured that no alteration whatever in the duties of foreign wines and spirits will take place here this session of parliament, of which we desire our mercantile friends may take notice.

Several alterations are spoken of in town, relative to the army.

The Green-horse, it is said, are to be disbanded, and the officers provided for in other regiments—they will certainly be removed from Dublin duty in the course of a few days, and their places filled by the Prince of Wales's Light Dragoons.

The Oxford Blues, it is also said, are to be disbanded.—Other reports say, that the four regiments of heavy horse are to be formed into light troops—and that orders have issued for preparing the necessary accoutrements.

Another alteration of a more extensive nature, is said to be in contemplation—which is, to diminish the number of regiments on the English and Irish establishments—but to raise the number of men in each regiment to 1000 strong.

It might be worthy of the consideration of Parliament, whether it would not be advisable to pass an act for vacating the seats of such officers as are stationed upon foreign duty, as well as of those members who neglect for an entire session to make their appearance in the House of Commons. It is ridiculous to suppose that the electors can be represented by persons, who from their station cannot, or from indolence will not attend the business of the nation.

The heads of a bill introduced yesterday evening by the Chancellor of the Exchequer in the House of Commons, for the relief of the men of the Royal Navy, and for the more actual payment of their wages to their families in case of their demise, deserves infinite commendatory notice. Such laudable consideration for so useful and spirited a body of men, is an irresistible incitement to their exerting when the service requires it, and will in great measure prevent the operation of an unconstitutional mode of obtaining our money by and brave tars by impressment.

The vacant see of Hereford, in England, is near to be filled by the translation of the Bishop of St. David's, in that kingdom, who has succeeded by our Bishop of Leighlin, in terms, his Majesty deeming that translation a compliment due to the memory of the late Duke of Rutland for his services, and whose Secretary that Right Rev. Prelate during his Grace's administration in this country.

It is to be heard, from respectable authority, that a new arrangement will shortly take place in the diocese, and that Mr. Murray, who is nearly related to the Duke of Athol, and possesses unusually promising abilities, will be raised to the office of Solicitor General.

It is evident, from the mention made by the late Mr. Fitzherbert, in the House of Commons, on Saturday last, of the returns and of the diocesan schools that had been made, that that Right Hon. Gentleman has seriously to take up the plan of education brought forward in the last session by Mr. Fitzherbert, to carry it into effect, than which it is more to tend to serve the rising generation of this country.
