Ordered, that his Majesty's most gracious answer be entered in the Journals of this House  
The Chancellor of the Exchequer moved, that an humble address be presented to his Majesty, to return our most sincere thanks to his Majesty for his most gracious answer to the address of this House; which was unanimously agreed to.  
Ordered—That such members of this House as are of his Majesty's most honourable Privy Council, do attend his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant with the said resolution, and desire the same may be laid before his Majesty, as the address of this House.  
The Right Hon. Mr. Mason moved, that this House will, on Monday next, resolve itself into a committee of the whole House, to consider further of the supply granted to his Majesty, for the purpose of laying a foundation for local duties, and for no other purpose.  
Ordered, that Mr. Speaker do issue his warrant to the clerk of the crown to make out a new writ for electing a burghers to serve in this present Parliament for the borough of Doneraile, in the county of Cork, in the room of the Hon. Hayes St. Leger, now Lord Viscount Doneraile.  
Mr. Knox moved, that the proper officer or officers do lay before this House a return of the number of civil bills entered with the registers of the different circuits for the last three years, distinguishing the number of civil bills entered at each assizes town of every county, county of a city, and county of a town; also the number of civil bills entered under five pounds; and also the number of civil bills left unruled in the Judges book at each assizes.  
Ordered accordingly.  
Sir F. Hutchinson observed, there was something very extraordinary in the allegations of that gentleman's petition, which states, that in the year 1785, almost forty thousand pounds having been paid out of the 42,500l. due by the late Sir H Cavendish to the crown, the House had then granted the petitioner 500l. for his trouble, in receiving those large sums; but that since that time all he had received had been paid in small sums, by bills of exchange, and occasioned him considerable trouble and charge, as he did not lodge any part of it in the Treasury, till it amounted to 500l.—He said he did know why that gentleman did so, unless by orders of the Commissioners, as the act of Parliament laid him under no such restriction; and if it had, he could not see that it was any great disadvantage to him.  
The Right Hon. Mr. Beresford assured the Hon. Gentleman, that the trust was forced on Mr. Winder, who otherwise had as much business to do, as he could possibly attend to; he said there was much greater trouble in getting in of small sums, than in receiving large ones; he observed it was but reasonable to make Mr. Winder compensation for the great trouble he had, in respect to recovering the debt due to the public, by the late Sir Henry Cavendish.  
The grant to Mr. Winder was agreed to.  
After which the House adjourned.
