HOUSE OF COMMONS.

TUESDAY, Feb. 5.

House resolved itself into a commit-

Mr. Mason in the Chair.

Chancellor of the Exchequer moved,
e sum of 2000l. a year be granted for

tion was unanimously, which was immedi-
ported, and the report was agreed to by

Mason brought up the report of the
tee of ways and means, for raising the

Chancellor of the Exchequer then
for leave to bring in one or more bills

and good set of people, and deserved encour-
agement; but he was afraid the mode pro-
posed would not answer the end; as he did
not think the high price that wool now bore
was owing to the quantity of yarn exported;
for that in the course of four years it has fell
considerably; in 1784, the exportation was
120,000 stone—in 1785, it fell to 80,000 stone
—in 1786, to 70,000, and in the last year, to
about 50,000 stone; and that if any higher
duty was laid on, it might be retaliated by
Great Britain, as very little or none was ex-
ported by us elsewhere; and the true cause
he supposed was that there is not enough for
the home consumption.

The Right Hon. the Secretary of State,
presented a petition from the woollen manu-
facturers of Cork, praying a continuance of
the bounties; which was received, read, and
ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Mason brought up the report from the
committee of Ways and Means.—The report
agreed to.

Sir Lucius O'Brien, moved that a duty of
nine shillings and two-pence halfpenny per ton,
be laid on all foreign cordage imported, except
the manufacture of Great-Britain and France.
He said there was a similar duty existing in
England.—Agreed to.

A conversation arose on the subject of tythes,
when Mr. Grattan, at the request of the
Chancellor of the Exchequer, agreed to defer
that subject for some days.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer presented
the great money bill—the loan duty bill—the
malt bill—the French tariff bill—the Post-
office bill—the sugar bill, each of which was
then read a first time, and ordered to receive a
second reading to-morrow. Adjourned.

Yesterday between twelve and one o'clock,
his Excellency the Marquis of Buckingham
went in state to the four Courts, and took the
oath of Allegiance and the usual qualifications
in the Court of Chancery.

It is reported that a Noble Lord, high in
the military department, intends resigning in
consequence of the reduction of the four regi-
ments of horse on this establishment.

On the reduction of the several regiments,
that is in contemplation—it is to be hoped,
that attention will be paid not less to the pri-
vates than the officers. The men belonging to
these different regiments have uniformly sup-
ported an unimpeachable character—and it is
but just to observe, that they have, therefore,
some claims on the liberality and generosity of
the public.

The officers in the several regiments of horse
must at all events lose considerably by the in-
tended reduction. We hear, that they are to
receive commissions in the regiments of light
troops, in lieu of those which they now hold;
but there is a difference in the pay of the light
and heavy horse, which is against them—and
for which, it is reported, no allowance will
be made.

We are informed that the four regiments of
horse on this establishment are shortly to be re-
duced, and that every means is making use of
to prevail on the privates to enlist for dragoons,
and that very high bounty money has been
offered them for that purpose, but they shew
a great disgust for that service, and we hear
that a great number of them intend to apply
to be admitted in the grenadier companies of
the several marching regiments.

A petition was lately presented to his Ma-
jesty, from Robert Keon, praying the royal
sign manual to a writ of error, in order that
his case, grounded on the points of law, which
were lately adduced in arrest of judgment,
might be heard before the House of Lords of
Ireland. His Majesty having considered the
petition, was pleased to refer the case to his
Excellency the Marquis of Buckingham.—His
Excellency, as is usual in such cases, has made
an order of reference to his Majesty's Attorney
