We are informed his Majesty's Royal Letter arrived for the promotion of four gentlemen to the rank of Peers of the realm, viz. Henry Gore, Esq; of Tenelick; the Right Hon. James Cuff, of Castle-Gore; Sir John Browne of the Naul, Bart. and Sir Nicholas Lawless, Bart. of Dublin: they will all, we hear, be introduced and take their seats in the Upper House, in the course of next week.

By the above creations, seats in the House of Commons will become vacant, for the county of Longford, for the county of Mayo, for the borough of Catherlough, and for the borough of Lifford.

Tuesday morning the Post-boy conveying the North mail to the General Post-office, was stopped about a mile this side of Drogheda, by two foot-pads, who robbed him of all the letters and packets from the different post-towns in the Northern district, with which they effected their escape.

The number of the Northern mail, which was robbed on Tuesday morning near Drogheda, amounted to the letters of 56 post-towns in the province of Ulster. The two fellows who robbed their faces blackened, and were not deterred by the example of Echlin, who was lately executed for robbing the mail, and now lies in the stocks for execution on Saturday next. Wednesday night the Northern mail was stopped, between Drogheda and Dunmurry, and plundered of Fifteen bags.
