Baronet's intention was to give fomething to the Clergy in fuch places, where there was little elle but flax or hemp; and as there were many places where the modus or cuftom was, to pay by the acre or otherwile; he was for an exception in the bill, fo as not to interfere with the modus or cultom of any place; to that the bill might be general, without that particular exception.

Sir Lucius faid, the tithe by the bill was only an acreable one plantation measure, and was merely a transcript of the English act, and that it was an indulgence of the clergy to take fuch small tithe, and he supposed it was

done merely to keep up the claim.

Mr. Brownlow thought it was better to confine the bill to the Province of Munfter.

Mr. Stewart (of Killamoon) faid, the Northern clergy did not demand tithe on flax, or if any was paid, it was very famall, and they acted fo in aid of the farmer,

The question being put, the word flax was expunged, and the bill relates to hemp only,

The House refumed, Mr. Maion reported, received, agreed to the report, ordered the bill to be ingroffed.
