Cork, March 10. Yesterday in the County Court-House, two men of the name of Collanane, and one Lyne, were capitally convicted of entering the house of Maurice Lean, near Maglin, and robbing the same of about seven guineas.

Same night, the house of Mortogh Connolly, mason, in the Irish-town, was burglariously broke open, and thereout stolen several articles of wearing apparel, some silver spoons, &c. the perpetrators of this robbery had the audacity to take part of the cloaths off the bed on which he lay.

Same night, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock, was feloniously stolen out of the lodgings of Thomas Morony, Esq; a striped muslin quilt, a pair of new blankets, and a pair of sheets.

On Saturday last, the Dublin post which arrived in this city, came attended from Nenagh by an able-bodied man, well mounted and properly armed, agreeable to a late order from the General Post Office.

Yesterday morning, at one o'clock, Mr. O'Brien, high-constable, apprehended and lodged in Goal, Michael Corbett, one of the fellows who had been committed for street robbery, and lately escaped out of the city goal;—there were found on him a great coat, jacket, shirt, shoes and buckles; a silver table spoon, and shoe-buckle; part of the property of Mortogh Connolly, whose house was broke open on Thursday night.—It is a very trifling compliment due to Mr. O'Brien to say, that the inhabitants are much indebted to him, for his perseverance and unwearied exertions in apprehending and bringing to justice, numbers of the most desperate robbers and rioters, which have lately infested this city.
