

Hamilton, lessee of the London Society, was defendant. This action was brought for recovery of damages sustained within a certain time past in the Earl's fishery in that part of Loughneagh which lies in the county of Armagh, by reason of the defendant's keeping up and maintaining on the rock or Salmon Leap near Colerain, certain works called the Cuts, which obstructed the passage of salmon and other fish from the sea into the said fishery; and after a hearing of nine hours and a half, the jury brought in a special verdict in favour of the plaintiff for 45l. damages, with costs.—Counsel for the plaintiff—the Solicitor General, Messrs. It is expected, notwithstanding the motion made by Sir H. Hartstonge on Saturday last, in the House of Commons, for a call of the House on Friday the 11th of April, was negatived, that the House will have a fuller attendance of Members on that day, than on any day during the foregoing part of the session; it is now a considerable time since a Grand Committee of Courts of Justice has sat, and from the seriousness of the proposed enquiry, it is imagined that a much greater number of Members will attend their duty in Parliament, than is usual at this season of the year.

The post-boy, it seems, who absconded from the prosecution of Echlin, who was lately hanged at the New Prison, for the robbery of the mail, was seduced on board a smuggling vessel, with large promises of reward, on being landed safe in France; he took shipping near Skerries, but when the vessel had been a day or two out at sea, the smugglers conspired against the boy, and threw him overboard. A discovery of the transaction is said to have been made by one of the party, who has turned approver.

COUNTRY NEWS.

Cork, April 3. These three or four days we had very stormy weather, the wind at N. W. which blew down several chimnies, unroofed houses, and we dread hearing several bad accounts from sea.

During the storm yesterday a market boat from this to the Cove, with several persons, was overset at Passage, by which four men and three women were unfortunately drowned.—On seeing the melancholy accident Mr. Parker's boat put out to their assistance and saved some of the persons, but an elderly woman whom they had taken into their boat alive, received so great a shock that she expired soon after.

Last week the Rev. Mr. Murry, a Roman Catholic Clergyman, of Bandon, going on his mission, was thrown by a skittish horse near CastleMahon, and received such hurt that he died in a few days after, sincerely and deservedly regretted.
