Yesterday a Privy Council, at the Castle, was attended by a more numerous affembly of Members, than has been known for many years

We are informed that the last dispatches arrived at the Castle from Lord Sydney's office, bring advice that his Majefty's Ministers have not thought it expedient to make the talked-of removal in the Admiralty department.

Owing to fome reports this day circulated, and intelligence received by private letters. that the Emperor of Morocca had declared war ngainst Great Britain-Insurances were refused by our underwriters on any terms, to and from Leghern and Cadiz,

The last letters from the Continent, as well as England, hold out the very great probability, and fome of them the certainty of a war on our fide, in taking part with fome of the prefent belligerent powers. This is the opinion of a great naval officer, who, within a few days, wrote a letter of this purport to a near relation in this city, and who faid, that in confequence of fuch an apprehention, he was ordered to attend his ftation.

Whatever appearances there may be of a general war, from the active exertions making in Spain, yer it may be depended on, that if the Court of London conceived any apprehenfion of a diffurbance in the tranquillity of its own affairs, reductions would not have been made in the military of both kingdoms. If Spein opposes the Russian fleer, it must be from the policy, which may probably be deemed a wife one, to prevent a very ambitious maritime power from forming fettlers

It may indeed appear fomewhat strange, that a Lord is admitted to the freedom of this city, as was the case on Monday laft; but while there is an attainder on the title, the possessor is only considered as a private citizen or commoner, and has it not in his power to fit in the House of Peers, nor of having the ouths administered to him in the fame, till the fame is entirely taken off by the interpolition or mandate of the royal authority-Next feffion, it is faid, his Lordship will be admitted to take his feat.

The place of Master of the Rolls which has fallen to the Right Hon, W. Wyndham Grenville, has but a very small falary annexed to it -the flared fum amounting to no more than 1301. The perquifites of office are fo very confiderable as to make the place, on the whole, worth about 3000 guineas per ann.

His Excellency the Marquis of Buckingham, will not make an excursion into the interior parts of the kingdom, this fummer, as reported. No fuch intention has been avowed, but on the contrary, the Viceregal-pair will difpofe of their time principally between the Castle and the Lodge in the Phoenix-park, during the course of the summer.

We have already mentioned, that there was no idea of a tour through the kingdom by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant. The Viceregal pair, however, will not pals the fummer without paying a vifit to the Lake of Killarney. The Marquis and Marchionels on their route will flop at Donore, the feat of Sir J. Nugent.

The public thanks are juftly due to Skeffington Thompson, Efq; for his spirited exertions at the late breaking open of the gaol of Trim, by the prifoners therein confined, who at the imminent rifque of his life secured as dangerous a banditti as ever infelted a country, three of whom were feverely wounded. Much thanks are also due to Cornet Orniby, who assisted with a party of the first regiment of borfe.
