o'clock. The Managers produced written evidence, which being gone through, Mr. Middleton was called to the bar, who underwent a long examination by the Managers for the Commons, the countel for the prifoner, and the Court, which did not finish till fix o'clock, when their Lordinips retired to their own House, and the trial deferred till to-morrow.

TWENTY-FIFTH DAY.

After the Court was opened, and Mr. Flattings appeared at the bar, -Mr. Adams rofe, and informed their Lordships that the managers next intended to bring proof to negative Mr. Hastings's third charge against the Beguns, namely, that they had encouraged the Jaghire Dahrs to rebel against the English government, and had affifted them in luch rebellion. This, as well as the former, was one of the grounds which Mr. Hastings had urged as a reason for feizing their treafures, and refuming their Jaghires. The letters were fent from Mr. Middleton and Col. Hannay to the Board of Calcutta. The minutes of the Council and dispatches from Mr Haftings were next read. The reading continued until two o'clock, when

Mr. Middleton was again called to the Bar, and examined respecting the contents of the documentary evidence which had just been produced. To speak candidly respecting his evidence, we fincerely believe that he gave the best testimony in his power; but having by his prior conduct unhappily involved his evidence in the labyrinth and mazes of myttery, it is no wonder that his talk was arduous. He flands in an awful lituation, and the embarraffment which he evidently feels, is a lesson to every man (whatever may be his wealth or influence) to beware of giving the least cause of suspicion before any Court of Juffice, much lels fuch an august tribunal as that before which he has appeared .

We thall touch upon a few facts only .- The witness could give no account of the cause of the mutilated book of his correspondence; but being pressed by Lord Loughborough, Earl Stormont, and the Managers, he at last (after various frivolous excuses) acknowledged that the mutilated parts were torn out, but by whom he could not tell.

His evidence respecting the affairs of Fizula Kawn, was equally doubtful. In short, the whole was one mals of doubts, helitations, and amendments. He was fent from the Bar at half after five, when the Court adjourned to the Upper Chamber.

At half after fix adjourned to Tuefday fe'nnight, when the High Court of Judicature will again lit.

Yesterday a Chapter of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath was held after the Levee broke up, when Sir G. Yonge and Admiral A. Hood were invelted with the red ribband, and

## D U B L I N, May 13.

By the fame channel we are informed, that at the time of the failing of the Betfey, freth provisions at Gibraltar were exceedingly dear ; and that all kind of communication between Spain and the British Garrison in that Fortress was put a stop to; and that the Spaniards had refused the fmallest supply of fresh provisions, even for the accommodation of the Governor though repeatedly applied to for that purpose.

By a gentleman that arrived yesterday from London, we learn that notwithstanding the report of large subscriptions having been entered into to support the credit of some principal houses, it is only a flattering attempt by the creditors concerned, and that no others have shewed the least intention of generosity on that head. One house only it is faid have flopped payment for upwards of one million sterling, and though the Bank of England had refuled their paper for the last twelve months, the Directors at a late meeting offered to advance them one hundred thousand pounds for nine or twelve months on proper fecurity, which genteel offer was declined, as being supposed inadequate. It feems this house in order to extend their trade, and at the fame time support their credit, had fet up many shopkeepers in various parts of the city and country, who accommodated them with their paper to any amount required, which houses are all now stopped of course, and having carried on very extensive manufactories in Lancashire, where even their five guinea notes of hand paid to their work people, &c. as calh, paffed fo current, that it is computed there is at this day, upwards of eighteen thousand pounds of them fmall fums unpaid, which together with the immediate stoppage of from twelve to fifteen hundred hands, is a most distressing circumstance, and it is much to be dreaded that things are not yet at the worst, as many retail linen and cotton houses in London must break, which of consequence will hurt our linen trade here and affect our next market.
