

AQUATIC EXCURSION.

On Monday last at 11 o'clock, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, the Marchioness of Buckingham, and many other ladies of distinction, attended by several noblemen, came from the Park to the Grand Canal at 7th lock, near Ballisfermot bridge, and embarked on board the Buckingham, a beautiful new passage-boat, followed by an elegant band of music, in the Mercury, a very handsome boat, fitted up for that purpose, where they not only enjoyed a most delightful water party for the day—but his Excellency more nobly employed his time in viewing and examining that great and useful undertaking, so spiritedly carried on at the expence of a worthy and respectable body of men, till they brought it to communicate with the great river Barrow, at Monstereven. The extension and utility thereof, have already established a trade, which all that part of the kingdom, as well as the metropolis at large, feel the happy effects of. Mr. Evans, the Company's engineer, by desire of the Lord Lieutenant, attended his Excellency all day, with such of his maps and plans as were necessary for the present information. His Excellency's scientific judgement, as well as taste, was strongly proved by his being so charmed, when he proceeded from Sallins to the Leinster aqueduct, that great and elegant structure over the river Liffey, one of Mr. Evans's first performances after he came to this kingdom, which, with his bold and masterly execution in sinking the cut through the mountain of Downings, so pleased the Marquis that he expressed his approbation of the abilities of the engineer, in the most graceful and flattering terms, acknowledging as soon as he had seen some parts of the bogs through which he had effected a complete navigation—that nothing but the most indefatigable experience in the different strata and soils in Ireland, could enable the first engineer in Europe to execute so great a work as he had done in so short a time.

They all dined on board the BUCKINGHAM, in the Bog of Allen, and returned in the boat as far as Landenstown, near Digby-bridge, from whence they took carriages across the country to the lodge in the Park. The boat then conducted the band and attendants into Dublin that evening being upwards of forty miles, from eleven o'clock—a proof that water conveyance can be made as expeditious a mode of traveling, as may be reasonably expected in any other way, notwithstanding the number of locks, which together with the cheapness, ease, and excellent accommodations given in the boats, by far exceed every other method.

In the Marquis and Marchioness of Buckingham's water excursion up the Grand Canal, on Monday, they were accompanied by Lady Dowager Granard, Mrs. Nugent, Dr. Little, Colonel and Mrs. Talbot, Mr. Dillon, Mrs. O'Donnell, a number of Aids de camp, and some of the gentlemen of their household.—The day was uncommonly fine, and the passage and accommodation afforded them much satisfaction. This mark of attention of the Viceroy to the Grand Canal Company, does him much honour, and what he has now seen of their works, must strongly incline him to favour their laudable and spirited undertaking. Little excursions into the country, whether by land or water, enable a Chief Governor better than ten thousand reports to judge of its state, and of what may be wanting for its relief or improvement.

Galway, June 2. On Thursday evening last, N. P. Trench, Esq; Collector, assisted by William Roach, Surveyor of Excise and William Lawless, Pro-Collector, with a party of the army, seized near Barna twenty-three hogheads of Claret, which they safely lodged in the Custom-house stores.
Cork, June 5. Yesterday a man fell into

barbarous murder was committed on Sunday last on the body of the Rev. Christopher Ryan, parish priest of Knocantowry, near this city, by Bridget M'Ellegir, his own servant maid, by cutting his throat at night as he lay asleep. It is confidently said, that Dunlow green will this year display more wool, and that of a superior quality, than has been known for twenty years past.—The fleeces are unusually thick, and the shearing already in great forwardness, particularly in the counties of Galway, Mayo, and Roscommon.

Last Tuesday the 70th regiment of foot was reviewed at Kilkenny, by the Hon. Major General Bruce.

A few days ago, the Rev. Deane Hoare, by the payment of two guineas, enlarged John Blackhall, a city debtor, who had been confined from the 24th of last November, for the sum of 8l.

Last Saturday John Downs, Esq; Inspector of Excise, assisted by Mr. Francis Hayes, L. C. Officer, and a troop of the 12th light Dragoons, brought in here and lodged in his Majesty's stores, two large private Stills, 3 Heads, and 2 Worms, which they seized in the district of Ennis on this expedition seven extensive private Distilleries were destroyed, and above 7000 gallons of pot-ale, singlings and spirits, spoiled; and the Still-house at Bow bridge, (where a party of the Military some time ago had been disarmed and several lives lost.) Mr. Downs had burned to the ground with the utensils, to prevent its been ever carried on again.—Mr. Downs' assiduity and unwearied attention in preventing frauds and protecting his Majesty's revenue in every department, justly entitles him to every mark of esteem.

This morning the man who attends the Post-boy from Nenagh, as a Guard, fell from his horse near Pennywell, and unfortunately broke his leg.

Committed to the county jail last Friday by Walter Widenham, Esq; Thomas Lynch alias Rutlege, charged with stealing a black mare, value 13l.—the property of Robert Heavy, alias Evans, of the county Westmeath, which mare was found in his custody.—Yesterday to the same Gaol, by said Magistrate, Edward Magrath and Mich. Sweeney, of Allroo, charged with breaking open a door, and discharging a musquet loaded with shot, in the head and neck of Timothy Brien, of which wounds his life is in imminent danger.

Died. Last Saturday, James Lyons, Esq; merchant of this city; his dealings were extensive and transacted with the strictest integrity; the number of tradesmen he employed and the numerous poor whom he relieved will feel a severe loss, while his family is left to deplore a most affectionate husband, and a tender parent. His friendship was equal to his humanity; he possessed many social virtues, which rendered him an agreeable companion, and his death is sincerely lamented by every person who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.
