

L I M E R I C K.

The Countess, or rather Princess of Dashkew, has lately paid that debt to nature, which humanity sooner or later must be liable to.—That much dignified personage once had been unanimously elected president of the literary society in Russia, where she made an oration that must ever reflect on her the highest honour, as it demonstrated that she was the philosopher, the christian, and lover of learning. This truly great character proved herself the friend to mental improvements, and could speak most of the languages in Europe with fluency and propriety. She honoured Limerick with a visit a few years since, and travelled through most of the countries in Europe, in search of knowledge and erudition.
