 His friends did not originally intend him for

 which leads some by the impulse of genius, he  
 took the vows of the minor order of St  
 Francis, and soon distinguished himself as a  
 preacher. He published his reasons in Dublin,  
 on conforming to the established church, and  
 soon became the most favourite preacher ever  
 known in this kingdom. There is no fort of  
 doubt, if his health is re-established, of his  
 meeting patronage and advancement in the  
 established church of Ireland.

Mr. Gardiner's house in the Phoenix Park,  
 is now entirely changed into a Barracks, where  
 part of the 17th regiment of Light Dragoons  
 took up their residence on Friday last.

Mr. Alderman Exshaw, on the 24th instant,  
 will be succeeded in the office of Divisional

 Alderman Carleton, in pursuance of his resig-

We hear that Earl Kingston's majestic edifice
