and the blessings of a constitution, which sets
equal value on the life of the peasant in his
mud-built hut, and that of the monarch seated
on a throne, and adorned with all the splen-
dour of a crown! that constitution under which
the object of government is the protection of
the people, and the energy of law the perfec-
tion of freedom; and let us take a little honest
pride to ourselves that it was reserved for Irish
genius to avenge the ravages of Asia, and the
spoliations of her ill-fated race, by a BURKE
—a SHERIDAN—a FRANCIS—all Irishmen
—who dragged to the bar of Justice—a man
whose system seems to be, to heap transgression
upon transgression, until a prodigious pyramid
of iniquity was formed, the top of which being
hid in the clouds, which surpass human eti-
mation—defeat iniquity, and defy punishment!

A foreign Gazette has an advertisement on
the part of his Sardinian Majesty, acquainting
the European Consuls at the different ports of
France, Spain, and Italy, that a rich mine, of
the purest fusible salt, has been some months
worked about two leagues from Coglian, the
capital of Sardinia, where a large quantity is
now ready to be delivered, free of carriage,
at the small charge of four sous per ton, in-
cluding duty and port expenses. It has also
been particularly intimated to all traders of
the British nation, that manufactures, especi-
ally serges, light cloths, and linens, of from
fourteen to twenty pence, or two shillings a
yard, will be taken in exchange, either for
salt, or other product of the Island, on paying
very moderate duty. Our merchants have an
ample field for speculation, or experiment, on
this occasion. This seems to open a free and
beneficial trade, which, in time, may extend
along the Mediterranean coasts, from the Straits
mouth to the Adriatic, including the islands.

LIMERICK.

The following is the decision concerning
barren lands, by Lord Chancellor Hardwicke,
in a case between Stockwell and Terry, on the
14th July, 1788.

Such land only comes within the clause of
the act as, above the necessary expence of in-
closing and clearing, requires also expence in
manuring before it can be made proper for
agriculture. Land inundated with waters, or
over-run with bushes, fuzze, whins, and bri-
ars, come not under the denomination of bar-
ren land within the statute, because of their
own nature they are fruitful, and the parson
shall not by this act be barred of his tithes by
the want of industry or negligence of the owner or
possessor.
