DUBLIN, JUNE 24.

A scheme will soon be put on foot, for forming a company to commence and carry on the laudable work of a Canal, from the river Boyne at Slane, and the river Liffey at Island-bridge; the distance is not quite twenty-two miles, and the line of land so near a level, that it is thought two locks would be sufficient to reconcile the few inequalities that might occur. As the Boyne is navigable for many miles, such a cut would open an easy and expeditious communication between our city and the counties of Meath, Westmeath, Longford, and Cavan, to the great emolument of the public.

Every man must applaud the idea of mitigating, at least, if not within the power of total suppression, the rage for drinking spirituous liquors, so destructive to the morals and health of the common people.
