By letters from Cadiz in Spain, to a gentle-
man in this city, dated May 30, we learn, that
all the bustle made about fitting out an arma-

Postscript Extraordinary.

LAST NIGHT arrived THREE PACKETS.

I T A L Y.

Naples, May 3.

THE plague having appeared at Mo-
dens, the King has ordered all the
offices of health to receive no mer-
chandise from the Morea, and to
make the ships from the Venetian provinces of
the Levant perform a quarantine of 40 days,
and those coming from Venetian Dalmatia,
Cattaro, Balza Cuzola, Castell-Nuovo, and
Ragusa, one of 14 days.

Letters from Pouille inform us of the de-
struction of the great bridge, which communi-
cates with Abruzzo, over the river Fortore, by
the arch giving way. The bridge was lately
built.

The Danes are arming a squadron of men
of war, which will consist of the Justice, of
74 guns; the Northern Lion, of 70; the
Louisa Augusta, of 64; the Oldenbourg, of
64; the Dirmarsen, of 64; and the Wilhel-
mina, of 60 guns.—They are to be commanded
by the Captains Bording, Ramshart, Winter-
felt, Claus, Tonder, and Falting.

The Order of the Bath, vacant by the death
of General Sir John Irwin, K. B. and Colonel
of the third regiment of horse on the Irish
establishment, is given to General Augustus
Pitt, Commander in Chief on the Irish estab-
lishment.

Extract of a letter from Paris, June 2.

"The Dauphin is better, and if the fever
leaves him, we have no doubt of his recovering.

"The squadron of evolution is soon to put
to sea; nothing new is going on in our ports,
except that they have launched a 74 gun ship
at Brest."

The Lord Chancellor, who has all along set
his face against the promotion of Sir Pepper
Arden to the mastership of the Rolls, it is re-
ported, refuses to put his final ratification (the
Great Seal) to the appointment. Mr. Pitt
waited on him yesterday at his house in Or-
mond-street, purposely, as it is said, on this
business.

Sir Richard Pepper Arden was on Wednes-
day sworn one of his Majesty's Privy Council.

Thursday came on at Lincoln's-inn hall, be-
fore Judge Buller, who sat for the Lord Chan-
cellor, the cause of Lady Strathmore against
Mr. Bowes. It consisted, first, of a bill filed
by Lady Strathmore, praying the Court to sub-
stantiate the deed which vested her estate in the
hands of trustees previous to her marriage with
Mr. Bowes; and secondly, a cross bill filed by
Mr. Bowes, which stated that Lady Strath-
more's deed of settlement was fraudulent, in-
asmuch as it was contrary to the rights of ma-
trimony, which being *sui generis*, were not to
be restrained by private settlements, made in a
clandestine manner, and unknown to the hus-
band. We shall not enter into the particulars,
or the cases which were stated in the plead-
ings by Mr. Partridge, in favour of Mr. Bowes,
and Messrs. Mansfield, Hardinge, Law, and
King for Lady Strathmore. At the conclusion

gaol by Alderman Widenham, suspected of
being concerned in said robberies; it is hoped
the rest of these nocturnal ruffians will soon be
brought to justice, as they barbarously ill-
treated Hewson's wife, because she made some
resistance.

Last Friday, John Downs, Esq; Inspector of
Excise, assisted by a detachment of the 27th
regt. seized a considerable quantity of smug-
gled tobacco in the suburbs of this city, which
was safely lodged in his Majesty's stores.
