cut away.

His Lordship was immediately dressed at the
Rock, and he returned that evening to town in
a carriage, where he is attended by Surgeons
Hume and Boulger; and we had the satisfac-
tion to hear yesterday morning, that it would
not be attended with any dangerous conse-
quences.
