At a general quarterly Meeting of the Go-
vernors and Governesses of the County of Li-
merick Infirmary, held this 1st day of July,
1788, (pursuant to Notices from the Treasurer,
in the Limerick news-papers.)
The Rev. Mr. Richard Lloyd, in the Chair,
The Rev. Deane Hoare, Treasurer, laid
before the Assembly a particular State of this
Charity, by which it appears, that since its
Institution on the 5th day of January, 1761, he
had (without any Salary, or making any Charge
whatsoever for his various Expences in the course
of 27 years and an half) received the Sum of
10,988l. 19s. 7d. and expended the Sum of
10,307l. 15s. 4d. and that of the balance
681l. 4s. 3d. he had (with the Approbation of
the Governors and Governesses) put the Sum
of 400l. out at Interest; and has, in his pre-
sent Accounts, charged himself with a Quar-
ter's Interest of 100l. of the remainder, the
current expences admitting of it.
