A gentleman who arrived a day or two since in this city from Bourdeaux mentions, that it is generally believed there that the French Monarch will relinquish his late proposed plan of establishing a *cour Pleniere*, having given other proofs, exclusive of his answer to the remonstrances of the clergy, of meeting what appears to be the sense of his people. Among other things, this gentleman says, that a letter had been received by a merchant in Bourdeaux the night before he left it, expressly asserting, that a change of the French Ministry was absolutely determined on, though it was deemed improper, for reasons of state, to announce it for some days.

Three days ago, an entry of one hundred and ten hogheads of Muscovado sugar, was made by a mercantile house in this city, directly from Grenada, being the greatest entry of this kind, directly from the West-Indies, we remember to have ever been made in this kingdom; a circumstance that gives us some expectation that a profitable trade to the British islands, for which so much has been sacrificed, may at last take place from Ireland.

It is astonishing how silently Earl Nugent is passing away his evening of life, considering the noise he made at the outset and meridian of it. But that man is a true philosopher, who having seen the worst and best sides of life, sinks into the contemplation of what is to come, and to all the world illustriously is lost.

We may shortly expect to hear of Christians ranged in order of battle against Christians, under the banners of Mahomet, as Sweden and the Porte are on the point of entering into a treaty of alliance offensive and defensive. This is an event the last that could be conjectured about a century ago.

Cork, July 24. This day part of the 21st regiment, or Royal Fusiliers, marched into town, on their way to quarters at Kinsale.

Kilkenny, July 23. Yesterday our assizes ended; at which, in the county court, John Lanigan and James Slattery were found guilty of manslaughter, the former was ordered to be burned in the hand and confined three months, the latter to be burned in the hand, and confined six months; Michael Hutchinson, for cow-stealing to be transported; Michael Breenan, for sheep-stealing, to be transported; William Mahony, for perjury, to stand in the pillory three times and to be confined twelve months; and Samuel Colclough, for an assault, to be imprisoned three months and fined fifty pounds.—In the city court, John Heney, for sheep-stealing, to be burned in the hand and confined for three months.
