Lord Justice Clerk said, that having expressed himself so fully on the subject, when addressing the Jury, he did not think it necessary now to resume what he had then taken the liberty of suggesting. He was happy to find that all their Lordships had entertained the same ideas of the very atrocious crime of rioting; and hoped the common people, who but too generally thought it a trifling offence, would be convinced, from this day's proceedings, that the laws were not to be trampled upon with impunity. The sentence, as proposed by Lord Hailes, was then pronounced.

All their Lordships expressed great concern at the necessity they were under of inflicting so severe a punishment upon a man, who, till these unhappy disturbances took place, had behaved himself as a good and worthy citizen, and maintained in a decent manner a wife and six children. He was, besides, far above the lower class, being a master weaver, and having a number of journeymen and other working under him.

—AUGUST 9.—

The *Hamburgh Gazette*, received this day, gives the following account of a sea-fight, between the Swedish and Russian fleets, which took place on the 17th of last month.

The Swedish fleet consisted of 15 ships of the line—the Russian fleet of 17. They came in sight near the island of Houghland, and an engagement soon after took place. The action commenced about five P. M. and continued till midnight, when the Russian fleet was dispersed. The issue of the engagement proved to be, that the Swedes had sunk one Russian man of war, and taken another of 74 guns and 780 men. The Duke of Sudermania went the next day into Sweabourgh with a ship of his fleet missing. It is thought the victory would have been more complete on the part of the Swedish Admiral, had not the disproportion of force, in respect to the size and number of ships, been so great between the two fleets. The account adds, that the Russian fleet is much shattered, while that of the Swedes has been very little damaged. The action took place about four sea miles off Revel in Livonia.

Mr. Fenwick, at Lloyd's, yesterday received a confirmation of the above intelligence.

There is a report, and we give it merely as such, that Admiral Greig was killed in the engagement between the Russians and Swedes.

DUBLIN, AUGUST 12.

The 27th regt. commanded by Major Gilman, were reviewed this morning by General Patterson, at the Fifteen Acres: the General returned his thanks to Major Gilman, for the soldier-like appearance and readiness of the regiment—and assured him he would be particular in his report to the Lord Lieutenant.

In France, the Benedictine Order, supposed to be the most wealthy since the Order of the Jesuits has been abolished, have very lately been commanded to deliver in to the government an exact and circumstantial rental of their estates, on pain of being subject to military execution.

By the master of a vessel which is just arrived, and was becalmed for some days off the Wicklow banks, we are informed, that on Wednesday last, about eight o'clock, P. M. the unruffled sea near the banks became suddenly extremely turbid, and a quick and undulation ensued, which continued for only three minutes, and then set in a north-westerly direction. This phenomenon, there is the smallest doubt, was the effect of some earthquake; and to this we must owe the destruction of the innumerable small fry which floated on the Liffey last Thursday—plenteously as almost to cover its surface. An English lady who has initiated a suit against Trinity College, as heiress to Doctor Baldwin, claims to the amount of six thousand pounds sterling.

We are very happy to learn that his Majesty's packet the *Penfonby* that sailed with the express was only 22 hours from the light house of Waterford until she landed the messenger, notwithstanding the wind was so unfavourable and so little of it. A gentleman who came in the *Venus* on Sunday declared the messenger was not ten minutes on shore Saturday afternoon till he set off for Cheltenham, orders having been sent to have a chaise ready the day before; it was on the strand as the boat came ashore, and he drove off at a very round rate.

The wind has been so favourable these few days from England, that we have frequently had the mail in 63 and 64 hours, from London.

We understand it is now determined on, that mail coaches are to be run from this town to Cork and to Dublin, to begin 25th March next.

Cork, August 11. Last week a Michael Ahern, who broke out the goal of Kilkenny, charged with a rape, was apprehended by Mr. Patterson, the Deputy Water Bailiff;—and yesterday he was transmitted from hence under an escort of a serjeant's guard; but this morning we hear he escaped from Rathcormack bridewell.

LIMERICK.

We learn from Coorehill, that on the night of the 7th inst. Mr. Thomas Powell, linen-draper, (son to the Widow Powell of this city) was alarmed by robbers who broke into his house; he jumped from his bed, and seizing a musket, put himself in a posture of defence; when one of the villains, entering his room, called upon him to submit or he would blow his brains out. "Fire away!" said Mr. Powell—the ruffian did so, and wounded him slightly in the shoulder: But Mr. Powell discharging his piece, shot the robber through the heart, who instantly fell dead: he proved to be a Carrier who used to ply between Coorehill and Dublin.

A Gentleman, tenant to John Prendergast Smyth, Esq; in the liberties of this City, was convicted before Aldermen Widdemham and Maunsell, Justices of Peace for this City and Liberties, of having permitted his Under-tenants to burn five Acres three Quarters of the estate of Mr. Prendergast Smyth, and was fined forty-six pounds, being at the rate of eight pounds for every Irish acre so burned, as the Act directs.—We hope this may in a great measure, deter other persons from pursuing so pernicious and illegal a practice, seeing how heavy a penalty is incurred thereby.

Last Tuesday a boat, with three young men belonging to this city, sailing near Foynes Island, overfet in a squall of wind, by which two of them were unfortunately drowned.
