

...ponellion, contrary to
 law, should be a caution to those deluded peo-
 ple, who seem to set justice at defiance, and to
 solicit their own destruction. By letters from
 Armagh, of a recent date, we are informed of
 a person in that County, who held a tenement
 under a clergyman's lease, and for a long time
 paid no rent, but the clergyman dying, the
 leasehold devolved to another clergyman, who
 shewing not so much lenity as his predecessor,
 had the man ejected out of the tenement, not-
 withstanding which he absolutely refused to
 give up the premises. The landlord a few days
 ago applied to the county Sheriff, who along
 with the Newry Volunteers, attended in order
 to dispossess the man, but all in vain, for,
 from a window, he told the Sheriff, that till
 five men and thirty rounds of powder and ball,
 for each which in the house were destroyed,
 he would not quit; upon which, the Sheriff
 and Volunteers not being sufficiently prepared
 to hazard an attack, departed, but returned
 the next day in company with the Armagh
 Volunteers, and two pieces of cannon, which
 was placed before the house, and fired repeat-
 edly but without any effect, till at last one of
 them being loaded heavy, it went off, and
 broke down part of the wall, but with the
 force of the charge, the cannon burst, and un-
 fortunately five of the Armagh Volunteers
 were severely wounded; the fellows in the
 house made their escape in the confusion, but
 we are sorry to hear that they have once more
 repossessed themselves of the tenement, so that
 it is feared a more melancholy tragedy than
 the former, will be the consequence of those
 villains temerity. The cannon which burst
 was of brass, and made a present of to the
 Armagh Volunteers, by Lord Charlemont, and
 cost his Lordship two hundred pounds.

A private council, it is said, is summoned

Cork, August 18. Friday last the Crown
 Court was ended in the City Court, when
 the following persons were capitally convicted
 and received sentence of death, viz.—Richard
 Kelly for a burglary and felony, committed
 in the dwelling house of Edward and Timothy
 Murphy, of Curra, in the South Liberties;
 and Timothy Mahony, for a burglary and felo-
 ny committed in the dwelling house of Mr.
 Edward Scott, at Bellinount, in the South
 Liberties.—In the County no person was
 capitally convicted.
