

also crop off his ears, and gave him several wounds in the neck and shoulder. Such cruelty to an innocent and useful creature, is a great disgrace to any country that pretends civilization; but what is still more surprizing, that the wretches who commit those heinous acts, do not consider that their villainy falls on their own heads, and upon many innocent people in their parish, who are obliged to make good the damage, and that though they have had strong hints that if they behaved themselves peaceably till next Session of Parliament, something might then be done towards relieving them from the grievances they complain of; yet, such is their eagerness to do mischief, that they chuse to reject the proffered good, rather than pass by an opportunity of gratifying their evil inclinations, but surely it is much to be lamented, that those who have no concern with tythes, any way, should be taxed to repair the damage done by those deluded miscreants; and that the real gentlemen, and men of consequence in the several parishes where such work is done, do not unite in defending themselves, and their honest neighbours, from an oppression more grievous than those which the White Boys complain of.

John Mahony, who was this day pilloried, is the first person ever tried in this city for personating another in entering into a recognizance before a Magistrate, and would probably have forfeited his life for this crime, if his prosecutor, through motives of humanity; had not had him indicted at common law for a misdemeanor only, as by an act of Parliament now in force in this kingdom, to wit, the 10th of Charles the First, this offence is made a capital felony without benefit of Clergy.

In the COUNTY. Daniel Bryen, for stealing a horse, value 4l 10s. the property of Barth. Leary, to be hanged on the 15th of November. Eleanor Burke, for stealing out of the house of Bartholemew Walsh, a cotton gown, to be transported. Jeremiah Sullivan, for feloniously assaulting and carrying away Mary Daly, fined one shilling, and to be imprisoned 12 months. Maurice Wallis, for assaulting Jeremiah Humphries, a sub-constable of Barymore, in the execution of his office, fined one shilling, and to be imprisoned three months. John Sullivan, for an assault on John Barry, Esq; fined one shilling and to be imprisoned six months. And also for an assault on Jeremiah Conway, fined one shilling and six months imprisonment, from the 6th of February next. Cornelius Collins, for an assault on Patrick Drury, fined one shilling, and to be imprisoned a fortnight.

In the CITY Richard Leary, for burglariously breaking and robbing the dwelling house of Edmond and Tim. Murphy, at Curra, in the fourth liberties, of several articles of wearing apparel, money, &c. his property, to be hanged on Saturday next the 30th of August. Timothy Mahony, for burglariously breaking and robbing the dwelling house of Rich. Scott, at Bellmount, to be hanged said day — Wilton Dawson, convicted of a highway robbery at July assizes, 1787, and sentenced to be hanged the 8th of Dec. following; but having escaped

RESOLVED that a COFFEE HOUSE be established in such convenient place as our Committee shall appoint.

RESOLVED, That no Game at Cards, Dice, or in any other manner whatsoever, be admitted in said House, and that the Member proposing such at any time hereafter, be forthwith Expelled, and never after be admitted a Member.

RESOLVED, That no Committee or future Meeting of this House, shall have power to alter or change the foregoing Resolution.

RESOLVED, That this House shall consist of One Hundred Original Subscribers, at One Guinea per Annum each, paying One Guinea to the Treasurer at the time of being admitted a member.

State Lottery Office, DUBLIN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in this Kingdom, entitled, "An Act for granting to his Majesty the several Duties therein mentioned, and for the better regulation of Lottery Offices," it is enacted, that from and after the first day of May, 1787, no Person shall publicly or privately set up, exercise, keep or open by himself, herself, or any other Person or Persons, any Office, or place for buying, selling, insuring, registering, giving or otherwise dealing in TICKETS or CHANCES, or SHARES thereof, or in the number or numbers of any Tickets in any IRISH or BRITISH Lottery whatever, or shall sell or dispose of at any one time any single Ticket, or any number of Tickets in any Lottery less than ten such Lottery Tickets, or shall, by writing or printing, publish the setting up, or using of any such Office or Place, or shall grant, sign or underwrite any POLICY or agreement for the INSURANCE of any Ticket, or shall take or receive any premium or consideration to make any such Insurance, without having taken out a LICENCE for that purpose, under the hands and seals of two or more of the Managers and Directors of Lotteries in this Kingdom, for the time being.

And by the said Act, it is also enacted, that no such Licence shall be granted to any Person or Persons, unless at the time of granting such Licence, it shall appear to the said Managers of the Lottery, by a certificate from the Officer for the time being, appointed for STAMPING SHARES of Lottery Tickets, that such Person or Persons had DEPOSITED with the said Officer, for stamping Shares of Lottery Tickets, not less than ONE HUNDRED TICKETS, if such Tickets be Tickets in an Irish Lottery, so to be divided into such Shares as the Person or Persons depositing the same should require, agreeable to the Acts then in force for dividing Tickets into Shares.

And whereas JOHN NICHOLSON and JOHN WELLS, now residing at No. 7, Dame-street, in the City of Dublin, have this day produced to the Commissioners appointed by his EXCELLENCY the LORD LIEUTENANT, for managing and directing the Irish Lottery for the year 1788, one or more Receipts from JOHN NORRIS THOMPSON, Esq; the Officer appointed by his EXCELLENCY the LORD LIEUTENANT for stamping Shares of Tickets, the full number of ONE HUNDRED TICKETS, to be divided into Shares as by Law directed; and the said NICHOLSON and WELLS have applied to the said Commissioners for a LICENCE, to enable them to open an Office for the purposes in said Act mentioned.

Now, we the subscribing Persons, COMMISSIONERS appointed by his EXCELLENCY the LORD LIEUTENANT, do hereby authorize and empower the said JOHN NICHOLSON and JOHN WELLS, of Dame-street, aforesaid, to set up, exercise, keep and open, a Lottery-Office, for buying, selling, insuring, registering, and otherwise dealing in Tickets, at their House, situate in Dame-street aforesaid, and at no other Place, for and until the 25th day of March next, as by Law directed.
