sequently take place, until official informations
are announced from the Secretary of State's
office in London.

The affizes of Cork, which were adjourned
for three weeks, were opened again on Mon-
day last before *Judge Bennett*, when an enquiry
was commenced into the conduct of several of
the Magistrates, on a charge made against
them for compounding of felony and other
mal-practices! but as the prosecution is said
to be of a vindictive nature, it is thought the
informer will be defeated.

While it is the practise of the English prints
to hold out the miserable state of the French
finances, and the impracticability of that power
to engage in a new war, the situation of Eng-
land is far from envious, as may be seen by a
recurrence to her enormous debt, and heavy
discharge of interest. In the year 1754, the
debt of England was up as high as Sir Robert
Walpole said it could ever bear, which was
75,000,000l. the interest of which amounted
to 2,650,000l. In 1774, the debt arose to
136,000,000l. the interest to 4,200,000. In
1784, the debt was 250,000,000l. the interest
15,000,000l. Thus has England still to struggle
under the peace establishment of 15,000,000l.
annually imposed upon her, to discharge the
interest of her national debt, which, if pro-
perly looked into, is as heavy as any debt due
by France; and the advantage we have over
them, is our being less troubled with domestic
distractions.

Upwards of one hundred publicans were
fined ten pounds each at the police office, last
Friday, for retailing spiritous liquors on Sun-
days, without wine licence.

The fatal accidents and miseries proceeding
from excessive use of spiritous liquors, afford
many opportunities of viewing the wretched-
ness of those who give themselves up to that
most pernicious custom. A shoemaker living
on the Coomb, deemed an excellent workman,
drank so much whiskey the day the tradesmen
had their pageant, that during the night, find-
ing himself parched with thirst he went naked
about twelve o'clock to a pump in a yard ad-
jacent, and having taken a considerable quan-
tity of the water, was seized with convulsions,
and expired in great agonies before seven in
the morning, leaving a wife and two children
in the utmost distress.
