

War-Office, Dublin Castle, Sept. 30, 1788.

Letters patent have passed the Great Seal of this kingdom, containing his Majesty's grant unto Isaac Corry, Esq; of the office and place of Surveyor General and Assistant to the Lieutenant General of all and singular his Majesty's Ordnance in this kingdom.

As also like letters patent, containing his Majesty's grant unto the Hon. Capt. Pakenham, of the office of Chief Keeper of all his Majesty's stores of Ordnance of this kingdom.

The accounts received here by the British mails, that arrived here yesterday, confirm in every particular, the intimation of an impending war, which was mentioned last Monday.

Houses of rendezvous have been opened on the quays for the reception of seamen—none others will be accepted of—many unemployed manufacturers offered, but were refused.

DIED. On the 15th inst. the Rev. William Rogers, curate-assistant of the parish of St. Paul, and some time chaplain to the garrison of Dublin.—Last Thursday, at Tralee, Mrs. Hurley, relict of the late Thomas Hurley, Esq; Attorney.

Waterford, Sept. 30. Yesterday at a meeting of the Corporation of this city, at the Council Chamber, William Weekes, Esq; was sworn in Mayor; and William Roche and John Denis, Esqrs. Sheriffs for the ensuing year.

On Sunday evening last, Mr. Robert Fenwick, a gentleman belonging to the army, was found dead in a field near the county gallows. From the situation he was found in, it is supposed he put an end to his own existence.

Died, Last Sunday morning, in Beau-street, the wife of Mr. Thomas Murray.

Clonmel, Sept. 29. Committed to our Co. Jail, on the 18th inst. by Samuel Cooper, Esq; Stephen Ryan of Thurles, who had been convicted of cutting thirteen young trees, in Ruffeen wood, belonging to the Right Hon. Lord de Montalt.

On the 21st, by Richard Cox, Esq; Michael Carew of Carrick-on-Suir, baker, charged on oath, with assaulting and battering Edmund Cullen, of Carrick, aforesaid, cordwainer, and with feloniously and forcibly tearing off the said Cullen's waistcoat, which had in one of the pockets, four guineas in gold, and one in silver, which the said Carew and his accomplice had taken away.

On the 22d, by Samuel Alleyn, Esq;—William Walpole, and Anne Caulfield, charged on oath, with having on Friday night, the 19th instant, broke into, and robbed the Cathedral Church, in the City of Cashel, of eleven linen surplices, part of which were found in the possession of the said William Walpole and Anne Caulfield.
