COUNTRY NEWS.

London-Derry, Sept. 28. A few days ago, the light infantry company of the 46th regiment, marched from this city to Rutland, where it will remain for some time.

Kilkenny, October 1. On Monday, James Wemyss, Esq; was sworn into the office of Mayor, and Edward Evans, Esq; into that of Deputy Mayor of this City, for the ensuing year.—Same day, Edw. Oldfield and Richard Butler, Esqrs. were sworn into the office of Sheriffs, for the same period.

Died. A few days ago, at Castle Morris, Mr. Terence Fitzpatrick.—The lady of Adam Colclough, of Duffry-Hall, co. Wexford, Esq.—On Thursday, Mr. John Breen, merchant, of Toghmon, co. Wexford, and the next day, Mrs. Breen, his faithful consort for many years.—On Saturday their remains were carried to the family burial-ground at Toghmon, attended by their numerous family, friends, and neighbours, by whom, during life, they were beloved and respected for their many virtues.

Kilkenny, Oct. 4. We hear from Wexford, that three small coasting vessels, laden with sand, for Ross, on board of which were twelve men, were driven ashore in a violent gale of wind on Wednesday forenoon, and instantly beat to pieces; providentially all the men were saved.

Thursday evening, Michael Conway, under sentence of transportation, arrived here from Waterford, escorted by a party of the 16th regiment; and yesterday was transmitted hence for Dublin.—He was found guilty at the last assizes of Waterford, of a murder committed at Tallow-bridge, and received sentence to be hanged, on the 19th of April; which was afterwards changed to transportation.

Youngal, Sept. 30. On Monday last, Walter Aikin Hayman, Esq; was sworn into the office of Mayor; and William Merrick, and John Sedgwick, the younger, were sworn into the office of Bailiffs of this Corporation, for the ensuing year.

The following discovery to make blue letters on sword blades, has lately been made by an American gentleman resident at Dunkirk. As a military spirit now prevails in Europe, our insertion of it may probably gratify some, and be useful to others:

"Take a well polished blade, and hold it over a charcoal fire till it is blue; then with oil colour write such letters as you wish should appear and remain, and let them remain. Then warm some strong vinegar, and pour the infusion all over the blade, which will infallibly take off the blue colour. After this process, a little common fresh water will take off the oil colour, and the letters will appear and remain of a curious and indelible blue. The same may be done with equal success on a common penknife, or any other instrument."
