This interval, it is devoutly to be hoped, is at no remote distance, when the extension of factories through the kingdom will give subsistence to multitudes of people engaged in them. That will be the happy moment for estates men to divide their lands into small farms, when there will be numerous bidders for them, from the properties, which manufacture gives them.

Should his Majesty's indisposition terminate, as intimated in the London prints, in a regular fit of the gout, it will be attended with far more excruciating pain to many an official gentry, than to our gracious Monarch. To the King, it will give a fore presage of long life—but a presage that will prove exceedingly unpleasant to a multitude of new ministry men, in-hospital.
