

We cannot give our readers a more convincing proof of the heart-rooted loyalty of the inhabitants of this kingdom, and their infinite anxiety for the speedy and perfect recovery of our beloved and most excellent Sovereign, than by informing them, that even the unfortunate debtors in the Four-Courts-Market, for a while, laid aside the hope of dawning liberty, and not only wished an Act of Grace, on the accession of a new Monarch, far removed, but, on Sunday last, before the doors were opened for the admission of strangers, they walked in solemn procession, made a fervent prayer, and repeated the anthem, "God save the King!" on the truly awful and critical occasion. This by a set of miserable unfortunates, whose situation, but for the humane and philanthropic attention of the humane Marshal and his Deputy, would be intolerable, speaks the loyalty of brave Irishmen more emphatically than the polemic prolixity of many volumes.

A curious spectacle was exhibited to the populace at Tholouse the 16th of last month, which gives a striking proof of the detestation wherein the late tribunal (appointed on the 8th of last May) was held by the inhabitants:—About nine at night vast quantities of faggots were piled up at the Place de Salin in that city, on which a scaffold of twenty feet square was erected. On this, nineteen puppets, representing the nineteen officers composing the tribunal, were placed. The figures were made, by the ingenuity of the artist, to resemble the originals both in features and coifs, and each, clothed in a robe, was seated agreeable to his rank. By means of four large globes, and a number of torches, the tribunal was clearly visible to the spectators, and the same order was observed in the disposition of the puppets as when, on the 2d of June, the prototype meeting held their first assembly, and were forced to abandon their seats by the hisses of the people. In this situation and arrangement a mock trial was commenced, when a person habited as a courier and superbly mounted made his appearance, holding in his hand the King's declaration of the 23d of September, by which the true Magistrates of the nation were restored, and the Bailiages again sunk into that significance from which they should never have been raised: At this moment, by an irresistible impulse, the torches, intended to give light to the spectators, were applied to the pile, and the fire reaching the figures, filled with powder, they were driven into the air and fell again in flocks on the scaffold. The rabble, looking on every thing contaminated which had been dedicated to the service of this court, would not even have some valuable pieces of timber forming a barrier round the pile, but with a sort of fury precipitated them into the fire, gathering up the festering remains of the members of the tribunal, in way of rendering them execrations as well as verdicts. Upwards of twenty thousand persons assembled on this ludicrous occasion, and no accident happened.

It is the general opinion among the faculty of London, that as none of the present Royal family of England, were ever known to be affected with the disorder under which the best Monarchs now labour, that there is every reason and well-grounded hope to believe, that the attack is temporary only, and will shortly decline, and thereby return our most precious King to his former happy temperate mind.

While with all the well affected inhabitants of these kingdoms, we feel a sincere grief at a Monarch's deplorable state of mind, we are without the strongest indignation, see the London prints, that there are in the metropolis of the Empire, minds so insensible to the feelings of humanity, who in their delirium can enjoy the diabolical satisfaction of seeing the Royal malady the subject of a caricature print. Let no man after this pretend that London is emerged from barbarism, when such flagrant enormities are permitted to be done.

WE can assure our readers, that our faithful representative Travers Hartley, Esq; does not, as was erroneously reported, to decline his business, but will continue to serve his country in general, and fellow citizens in particular, if they desire it, in the same station as he is worthily filled.
