

We hear from Bridge-town in Barbadoes that on the 24th of June there was the greatest procession of Freemasons in that town that ever was seen in the West-Indies; the first Lodge, consisting of near two hundred respectable gentlemen, was headed by John Thompson, Esq; from Belfast;—the second was composed of all the officers of the 49th regiment, headed by Major Grant; the 3^d, of the serjeants and non-commissioned officers, headed by quarter-master Branwood, after which, eleven other lodges marched according to seniority to church, where they heard a most excellent charity sermon, in consequence of which a collection was made for the support of the poor of every denomination, amounting to upwards of one hundred and thirty pounds, which was handed over to the different clergymen, Ministers and Priests of the island, to distribute among the indigent and necessitated; all this was the work of Mr. Thompson who brought Masonry to the highest pitch all over the West Indies, and who is as worthy a character as exists.

Sunday being the Feast of Saint Andrew the Apostle, the Tutelar Saint of Scotland, several parties of gentlemen, natives of that country, and who are resident in this city, dined together in honour of the day, and spent the evening in the utmost festivity and harmony.

The abundance of the late harvest in this kingdom almost surpasses belief; oats are in such plenty in some of the inland places, that at the town of Clara, near Tullamore, this grain was last week offered and sold at so low a price as three shillings the barrel.

The scheme of a navigable Cut or Canal from the North Eastern part of this city to the interior districts of the county of Meath, mentioned some time ago, is by no means given up; on the contrary, we hear, accurate plans and estimates are ready to lay before Parliament at its meeting in January next. Among the several advantages that will attend this navigation is the very small number of locks that will be necessary to construct, on account of the level of the lands through which its course is intended, and the free champaign face of the country.

A few days ago the mountains about Lixnaw were covered with a deep snow, though none had fallen in the low lands. It is also said, that the mountains of Morne, between Drogheda and Carlingford, besides Sleevegullen, and other hills in the counties of Armagh and Down, are as white as any of the Pyrenees or Alps, by a late heavy fall of snow on Sunday and Monday last.

The astonishing drought of the weather, at this season of the year, is likely to be very injurious to the seed corn in the ground; the earth is so parched, that the wheat cannot spring, and will be in a very weak situation to resist the winter's frosts, manufactures are also very much injured by the want of water; the paper-
