 KEW PALACE, Feb. 11.

HIS Majesty was yesterday in a state of
 composure, has had four hours sleep, and
 is more than usually recollected this morning.

Signed by the PHYSICIANS.
 On Saturday his Majesty, with the usual at-
 tendants, took an airing upwards of two hours
 in Kew gardens, and the same evening her Ma-
 jesty and the Princess Royal visited the King
 in his apartments for a considerable time longer
 than heretofore.

It is with uncommon satisfaction we have
 observed, by the report of the Physicians for
 some days past, that his Majesty's state of
 health becomes more and more favourable;
 and we hope soon to see that moment arrive,
 when our beloved Sovereign will be perfectly
 recovered.

His Majesty walks out every day in Kew-
 gardens, and when he meets the Princesses,
 converses with them with the most perfect re-
 collection. On Wednesday the King shaved
 his face, and, what was most difficult, the
 whole of his head; and appeared as collected
 as at any time of his life.

Yesterday at four o'clock the Queen was
 again introduced to his Majesty, where she
 continued till a quarter before six o'clock.

Saturday the House of Commons, in Com-
 mittee proceeded in the Regency bill, in which
 among others, the following clause is intro-
 duced, "That if his Royal Highness George
 Augustus Frederick, Prince of Wales, shall
 not continue to be resident in Great Britain, or
 shall at any time marry a Papist, all the au-
 thorities vested in his Royal Highness, by vir-
 tue of this act, shall cease and determine."—
 These produced very warm debates, particu-
 larly between Mr. Burke, Mr. Pitt, and Lord
 North; after which the Chairman reported
 progress, and adjourned to Monday.
