Last Saturday were committed to the county
jail, by Walter Widenham, Esq; Patrick and
Timothy Neal, charged on the oath of James
and Timothy Cunnigham, with breaking into
their house at Cahirconlish, and firing at them;
both the Neals had their skulls fractured in the
fray, and Timothy died yesterday in jail; the
Coroner's inquest will be held this day, when
it is hoped the cause of this dispute will appear
to the jury, and the aggressors be brought to
justice.

It appears by the information of the dying
man that three of the Neals went to the lands
of Ballyhoulane to distrain some sheep for
grazing money, when they were violently at-
tacked by the Cunnighams, who rescued the
sheep, forced their arms from them, killed one
of them, and the other being trepanned, is not
expected to live; James Cunnigham has been
lodged in jail.

Yesterday evening, there was a desperate
