The large sums of money, granted this ses-
 sions, for extending the inland navigations of
 the kingdom, cannot but meet the cordial ap-
 probation of every friend to the rising welfare
 and consequence of his country. Such grants
 do not operate, as is too often the case, to the
 promotion of private emolument. But inland
 navigations are objects of such expanded mag-
 nitude, as embraces the interest of almost every
 individual in the nation.
 The spirit with which the Canals of this
 country will henceforth be pushed forward,
 promise important consequences to the internal
 trade of the kingdom. The advantages of
 those Inland Navigations have been so bene-
 ficially experienced in England, that plans of
 vast magnitude have been engaged in, whereby
 the whole country will soon be connected
 through its principal manufacturing parts.—
 By the junction of the Severn with the Thames,
 London, Bristol, Liverpool, and Hull, will
 derive important benefits—the distance to Lon-
 don bridge from the Severn, with all the wind-
 ings of the Thames, being less than 170 miles
 by Oxford, &c. The advantages to trade, es-
 pecially in war time, are strikingly apparent
 from this course, and the communication with
 Ireland will also be rendered free from the
 dangers of an enemy. A complete voyage from
 Bristol Quay to London-bridge may be perform-
 ed, it is expected, in one week generally, at a
 moderate expence.
 The Parliament of this kingdom, will not,
 as was generally thought, be prorogued on
 Monday se'nnight after the bills are passed.
 Too much praise cannot be given to that
 truly humane and benevolent character Gen-
 eral Massy, for his singular attention to the for-
