The Court are highly offended; 25,000 thousand troops are arrived at Paris, and the rioting was not over when the last letters came from thence.

Yesterday (13) Earl Stanhope moved to have the House of Lords summoned for Monday next, when he should move for leave to bring in a bill for relief in matters of conscience.

Yesterday Mr. Wilberforce, having moved the order of the day respecting the consideration of the Slave Trade, entered very fully on that subject, and was heard with particular attention. The final consideration was postponed till Monday next.

HOUSE OF LORDS:

TUESDAY, May 12.

Their Lordships did not enter the court in Westminster-hall till one o'clock; when Mr. Grey rose, and began to produce written evidence in support of the charge relative to presents. Many documents were read, for the purpose of proving the truth of what Mr. Burke had asserted in his speech on this charge. This adduction of evidence, accompanied as it was with occasional disputes between some of the managers and Mr. Hastings's counsel, employed the court till five o'clock.

After they had returned to the house, the Peers sent a message to the Commons, purporting that they would resume the trial of Mr. Hastings on Thursday next.

They then passed several private bills, of which they sent notice to the other house.

DUBLIN, MAY 19.

It was so confidently reported last Saturday, that the appointment of the Rt. Hon. J. Fitzgibbon to the Chancellorship, had arrived, that a number of gentlemen congratulated him on his promotion; he politely returned their compliments, but assured them they were premature.—It is, notwithstanding, the general and received opinion among those who have the best opportunities of knowing the fact, that no doubt exists of that gentleman's appointment.

Whatever may be the improvement of taste and science in the sister kingdom, it is but poorly illustrated in the instance of 500 persons assembled, from distant quarters, and paying half a guinea a piece for the delicate amusement of beholding two professed suffians engaged in a boxing bout; yet such is the reigning and favourite amusement of the British gentry at present; and the very newspapers of the most fashionable circulation, occupied in singing the battles and conducting the literary disputes of those learned professors of the pugilistic art. 'Tis an happy trait of national politeness, when history and the *Belle Lettres* are banished the conversation of the British *Beaux esprit* under the name of *Pedantry*, and when the gutter contests of Coal-heavers, Corn-porters, Constables and Jew pedlars—occupy the conversations of the great, while their phraseology is enriched by *cross buttocks*, *bread-basketters* and all the polite lingo of the *bear-garden*. We hope this amiable branch of civilization will not find its way to the young gentry of Ireland, so partial to British importations.
