KING'S BENCH.
Trial of Mr. JOHN MAGEE.
Saturday, 4th of July, 1789.

At ten o'clock the Court was crouded, the Judge, Lord Earlsfort, took his feat about eleven, when the Jary were called, and the following respectable Citizens were sworn, viz.—Henry Darley, William Smith, Benjamin Clarke, Robert Magee, John Ormston, Charles Williams, Charles Ward, Edward Forbes, John Patrick, Alex Jafferys, Jun. The Cryer was ordered to call Mr. Magee, to appear in Court to answer the charges that should then be made against him, but on account of fome informality, Mr. Magee was not fuffered to come into Court till the trial was nearly over; all the wirneffes against him had been examined, and the leveral paragraphs read that were alledged to be libels. Mr. Magee not having employed any Counfel, and the diffreshing circumstance of a man's being put on his trial without being fuffered to be prefent, no doubt, induced a Gentleman of the Law, a King's Countel, to fland up in his behalf, when he was afked by the Judge, if he had got a license to plead on that business, which immediately filenced him, - but fome time after, a Lawyer came from the Court of Chancery, it is faid, by directions of an eminent Character, and addressed himself to the Bench, demanding an immediate Habeas Conrus to bring the Defendant into Court, which was granted .- Mr. Magee was introduced a little after one o'clock, when after a thort paule he protested against the whole proceedings as being illegal, contrary to law and magna charta; that he faould have been prefent before the jury were tworn, to have made his objections, and to have cross examined the witnesses. As to the Jury he could have no particular objection to any one of them, but he lelt for his injured Country, imperial Ireland, -he then withdrew, and the trial went on without any defence being made.

Lord Earlsfort, fummed up the evidence in a short charge to the Jury, whom he informed if they believed the Defendant to be Printer and Proprietor of the papers in question, which could not be doubted from the evidence before them, they would would find him Guilty.

The Jury withdrew for upwards of half an hour, when they returned their verdict Guilry of printing and publishing on LY. The Judge informed them, that would not do, as they must either declare on their oaths, which perhaps, their falvation depended on—Guilty or not Guilty.

They again went back for a full half hour, and returned their verdict-Guilty.

So that it now rests with the Judge to pass whatever sentence he pleases next November term; however, there is very little doubt but the verdict will be set aside, and a new trial granted.

Mr. Magee was bailed out on Saturday evening, and went immediately down to Dunleary,

to his fweet little children.

The King's Counfel who stood up in behalf of Mr. Magee, was Mr. A. Browne, of the College; Mr. Lysaght, of the county of Clare, was the Counsel who demanded and obtained the Habeas Corpus.
