## DUBLIN, JULY 11.

Their Excellencies the Lords Justices, we can assure our readers, have peremptorily shut the ports of this kingdom against the exportation of wheat and flour, on any pretence whatever. Biscuit is also included in this proscription.

Lord Mornington, we hear, is appointed Joint Paymaster of the forces in England, vacated by Mr. Grenville in his promotion to the Secretaryship of State.

Seventy thousand pieces of linen were sold at the late market, more than was sold at last October market.

The application of the French Ambassador to the British Minister, and the prospect of being nearly complied with, marks the humanity of the present æra. There was a time when no such concession would take place, from an improper jealousy and distrust of each other, which led to recriminations of a very disagreeable nature. England experienced a great scarcity of grain during the reign of Charles the First, and an embargo was laid on the export of grain from any of the Spanish ports to that country. Ireland suffered in a pretty similar manner during the same period. It happened, however, that in five years after, Spain was in the like predicament, when the English ports were shut, by way of recrimination, against any exportations. Though the British harvest was then good, an improper principle of retaliation took place. It is now ever hoped, that the wants of the French, in this time of national distress, may be relieved, provided grain can, with internal safety, be properly spared.

We may venture to say, that France is nearly a free country: What time it will take, and what difficulties they will find in fixing their constitution, it is impossible to conjecture:— This, however, we may safely assert, without the spirit of prophecy, that the permanent welfare of Great Britain will depend on the wisdom of the plan they shall choose.
