A soldier belonging to one of the regiments in our garrison, received so severe a punishment at the halberts, a day or two since, that he survived his sufferings but a few hours.—Infor- mations it is said, are lodged against the commanding officer and surgeon of the regiment:

A fraud of the most extraordinary nature has lately been practiced on a Banking-house in London:—A person of a gentlemanlike appearance lodged the sum of ten thousand pounds in the Banker's hands, "as I am going abroad," said the sharper, "and shall have occasion at different times to draw this money, you will please to accept twenty bills for me of five hundred pounds each." The Banker consenting, he drew the twenty bills, in which he contrived it so, that the word "hundred," which followed the word five, should be close to the margin of the paper, and in the next line left a space, as it were for the stamp, before the word "pounds;"—when he had drawn the twenty bills, the Banker underwrote his acceptance, and here the transaction ended for that time. A few weeks after the bills were presented for payment, when it appeared that the margins, in which the words "hundreds" were written, were cut away, and the words "thousand" written on the following line, where the blank for the stamp had been left in each bill; the payment was accordingly refused; but the presenters, (to whom the bills had been remitted from Paris, where they had been negotiated,) insisting upon payment, brought the matter to a legal issue, when the Banker was decreed to pay the full amount expressed in the bills, whereby he must lose the enormous sum of ninety thousand pounds!
