place the flood had rilen to no leis a height than tour feet in every houle; many of the wretched inhabitants of cabbins, who were confined to ground floors were obliged to quit with their children, leaving their little furnivere, &c, to the mercy of the waters. Is being market day, and the weather extremely fine, the town was confequently much crouded. which added confiderably to the confusion ; all were in alarm1-mothers running promitcuoully, they knew not where fcreaming for the fuppofed lois of their offspring-hulbands in fearch of wives and children-hories, fome with and others without riders, driving thro' the fircets; in thort, every face wore the marks of diffraction, not knowing what to impute the caule of their alarm; iome without giving themlelves time to confider what courfe the waters took, thought the fea was pouring in upon them, while others more ignorant imagined the world at an end.

At fix the flood began to fall, and at eight the river was very little higher than it utually is at this feation of the year; however, notwithstanding this general confusion, there was but one life loft, which was that of a young man of the name of Cronin, who happening to fland on the battlement of a finall bridge opposite the New-Gaol, was called to by a poor woman to affiit her getting up alto, on which he humanely reached her his hand, but the woman, becoming alarmed at the rapid motion of the water, and letting go her hold, the unhappy man fell back into the river, and was inftantly hurried under the Parade arch and drowned. His fate is the more to be lameated, as we are informed he was the only support of a mother and three younger children, who have now to depend on the bounty of the benevolent. After a diligent fearch, his remains were next morning found, near a mile diltant from the town.

What makes this flood the more extrodinary is, that we have had no rains in town during the day, nor in any other part of the country, for fome time before; but we fince learn, that it was occafioned by a tremendous fhower which fell in about the circumference of a mile, and which could be compared to nothing lefs than the burfting of a Welt-India tornado, as the water defeended in ftreams or fheets, continuing bat a few moments, preceded by a fingle clap of thunder. Extract of a Letter from Ballinafloe, Aug. 17.

"Since I wrote laß there was no bulinels to fignify till Friday; the buyers met, and came to certain refolutions that evening—Saturday a little was done—but this day fomething confiderable. I believe there are 7 or 800 bags of fleece wool now fold; a few indifferent and coarfe parcels at 14s, and 14s 6d.—and the reft from 15s, to 16s 6d. So tedious a market never was known—and it may perhaps hang on two or three days more;—however, measures are now taking (by the buyers principally) to prevent fuch delays in future"
