The Spanish Ambassador has had another confultation with the Minister, and communicated not only his own opinion, but his instructions, in a mode exciting much less apprehension than before.

The Europa man of war of 50 guns, lately errived from Jamaica, is ordered to be paid off and laid up in ordinary. This thip has been in commission since the peace, having wice occupied the Jamaica Station, with Commodore Gardner and his predecellor Adniral Gambier.

The Court of Directors have agreed to take ip 31 thips for the Company's fervice for India his featon. They are to be deftined as folows: Eight to Bengal; 20 to China; two to Bombay; and one to Bengal and Bencoolen --iome of the China thips are to touch at Maras; two of them are to proceed to St. Heena with provisions and stores for the use of hat illand.

In addition to the above, the company have ngaged the thips which are to transport the onvicts to New South Wales to take in teas Canton at Iol, per ton. This is a great aving both to Government and the Company, s the thips would otherwise have been obliged o return without any cargoes, the East India company having the exclusive privilege of rade in those parts; and it is somewhat reparkable, that although thefe fhips are emloyed on a national fervice, yet they are obged to have a licence from the East India lompany, their charter extending to all places aftward of the Cape of Good Hope.
