What a grand prospect for the sale of British goods for when so many hundreds of millions of acres of land lie idle to be granted or purchased at a small price, the people of this country never will manufacture: At present wages are high, and 1000 acres of land in the Back Settlements may be purchased for as many pence.

"I have travelled through several of the States, and see no appearance of that poverty which you hear so much boast of in Britain—every where I meet rather with extravagance. Indeed they procure too easily to be frugal in their out-givings. All the manufactured goods imported from Europe are from Britain, and they cannot have goods equal in quality and price from any other place.

Saturday afternoon, about four o'clock, a melancholy accident happened at the apartments of Signor Invetto, at the Grove Tavern in this city, occasioned by some powder taking fire, which communicated to several pieces of fire-works in the room, by the explosion of which his wife and son were instantaneously suffocated, and afterwards scorched so as to render them dreadful spectacles. This very ingenious foreigner was from home when the catastrophe happened—on his return, finding the situation of his wife and child, his agonizing feelings cannot well be described; whatever can be conceived of despair, frenzy, and horror, were depicted in his countenance. He has lost every thing he possessed in the world; but above all, what he prized superior to every other considera- tion; for he was exemplary in his attachments and duties as a husband and father.

Sir Richard Heron lies dangerously ill at his house in Grosvenor-square. His disorder is a fistula, for which he has undergone a severe surgical operation. Sir Richard has been subject to this dreadful complaint for some years, and underwent a similar operation in Ire- land, when Secretary to his Excellency the Earl of Buckinghamshire.

Though the Judges are deemed independent of the Crown, yet they may be called to an account for their conduct in the Parliament House, as there are four Grand Committees always appointed at the beginning of each ses- sion, the first of which is, to examine into mat- ters that may be prejudicial to the interests of religion; and the second to take cognizance of the conduct of Judges, if any charge should be brought forward against them for mal-practices, or acting contrary to the laws of the land, and if found guilty of a manifest breach of the same, the three estates of the Legislature can remove him or them from office, and an im- peachment also take place which may affect their lives and properties.

A Judge had been formerly flayed alive in England for mal-practices, and his skin stuffed and hung up, in terror to others of his frater- nity, lest they might imagine, that their high and important station might screen them from the hand of public justice.—The corrupt and murdering Jefferies, however, escaped with impunity, but had he lived in the reign of King William, he would have paid with his life, (which would have been but a poor recompence) for the various crimes he had committed — Lord Bacon, though justly considered the first philosopher of his age, was convicted of taking a bribe, and for ever after incapacitated from serving in any judicial capacity.—That sub- lime poet Pope, when mentioning the character of his Lordship, in his "Essay on Man," terms him, 'the greatest, meanest, wisest of mankind.'

The late treaty between Spain and the Ame- rican States, relative to the cession of conside- rable tracts of land, and the privilege of set- tling and cutting logwood at Campechy and the Bay of Honduras, cannot but give umbrage to the British Court, when it is considered, that the most trifling interruption to that branch of commerce was the original, if not the only cause of the war of *thirty-nine*, which lasted till the conclusion of the treaty of Madrid, by Sir Benjamin Keene and General Wall, in 1746. How Great Britain may digest this partition of commercial favour, is a point that will soon be determined in the Cabinet.

Letters were received yesterday from New- York, by the Revolution, Capt. Jenkins, arrived at Cork, dated the 23d July, which mention that their harvest throughout America, proves more abundant, than for many years past— it had been saved in most of the Southern States.
