

By a gentleman who arrived here from London last Thursday, we learn, that some very important news was hourly expected from the Continent at the Secretary of State's office, on which account two of the clerks were ordered to attend there all night, for the purpose of carrying the dispatches without delay to his Majesty's ministers. It is thought these important advices are to come from the Netherlands, as no less than four Messengers failed in the course of last week from Harwich to Helvoetsluys.

It was yesterday confidently reported in all the polite circles, that the Parliament of this kingdom would not suffer a dissolution until after the next sessions. The reason given, is, that another prorogation has taken place, to the 1st of December next, which would not have been the case if there was to be a period to its existence. We don't, however, admit this to be a conclusive one.

As a corroborative proof that the current reports of a speedy change in the lieutenancy of this country are well founded, we mention the following fact:

All the bills of the Marquis of Buckingham, even down to the smallest and minutest, have been called in and discharged: and every matter relative to his household so arranged, as indicates his intention of not returning to this kingdom.

Among the candidates for the Lieutenancy of Ireland, on its immediately expected vacancy, one was confidently mentioned, as most likely to be appointed—that astonishes every body; and this no other than the Earl of Winchelsea, the well known second of Lieutenant Colonel Lenox in his duel with the Duke of York.

The nobility of France, are carrying all before them at their sovereign pleasure. It is only necessary to give out a report against a magistrate, or even a nobleman, or gentleman of the first distinction, and his death is inevitable; if discovered, the King's brothers would have no more mercy shewn than the commonest culprit.—The hanging a Governor of the Baillie was indeed strict justice, or of those who monopolized the corn in times of scarcity; or even such a fate bestowed on a Lieutenant General of police, would not be deemed too severe, a punishment—Traitors to constitutional liberty and their country, should be served so every where.

The last exportations of flour to France, we hear, came to a very bad market; the plentiful harvest in that country having restored the wonted abundance.

Last Friday three deserted boys who had been in the Poor House, were sent to Shannon-Grove Charter-school by order of the Governors.

Last Saturday one of the Lunatics in the Poor House, who had escaped to Kilmallock, was brought back to the House, after doing a good deal of damage in the country.

The following Persons were admitted into the County Hospital as accidental Cases this Month: Patrick Farrell, fracture of the skull by a stroke of a hanger, the bone was quite cut through; James Barkly, a gunshot-wound at the ankle, the bone badly fractured and a mortification ensued; Patrick Lawler, a compound fracture of the arm; Thomas Noonan, a dislocation of the ankle; Mich. Welsh, kicked by a horse over the stomach; Stephen Hiffernan, concussion of the brain, having received a violent stroke on the head; Jeremiah Bridgeman, a fracture of the thigh; all those are in a fair way of recovery except Barkly, still the Surgeons are in hopes of saving his life. Rioters will not be admitted, though recommended by a Governor, until Half-a-Guinea is paid to the Treasurer, as a help to defray the great expence of the House. The Governors found it necessary to establish this rule, on account of the great number of rioters from the County and City, filling up the Beds and depriving the other poor objects from being received in their turn.
