

gave great alarm, the Minister of the War
 department has sent in a return of all the troops
 within twenty leagues round the capital, the
 total of which only amounts to 2610 men.
 It is said that the German Confederation de-
 termined to back the remonstrances of the Ger-
 man Princes who have possessions in Alsace, and
 that the confederacy will join with them in a
 general protest to the Crown of France, to re-
 vail the resolutions of the National Assembly of
 the 4th of August.

M. Bouche, Deputy from Aix, lately de-
 cided, that the number of French who had
 left their country, exceeded 80,000, and that
 their subsisting revenue might be stated at 15
 20 millions.

LONDON, OCTOBER 5, & 6.

At the departure of the last messenger from
 France, a report prevailed that letters had been
 intercepted, by which it was discovered that
 the Swiss troops in garrison on the frontiers of
 France, were preparing to facilitate his Ma-
 jesty's escape to Metz, where an army of
 10,000 men was waiting the arrival of the
 monarch. It was also asserted, that there was
 a large body of Royalists at Luxembourg; that
 the regiment of Orleans cavalry was within 15
 leagues of Paris, and was ordered to be ready
 to march at a moment's warning.

The injury which the commerce of France
 has sustained from their commotions, is almost
 irreparable. At Rouen, Bourdeaux, Nantz, &c.
 many of the most considerable houses have fail-
 ed; and as they had enjoyed credit to an un-
 limited extent, the mischief will be the more
 widely extended.

It has been whispered in the polite circles,
 that there is likely to be a serious misunder-
 standing in the Cabinet, in consequence of a
 certain great law officer at the head of his de-
 partment having positively refused to affix the
 Great Seal to Mr. Eden's pension. It is cer-
 tain, that some measures lately adopted have
 been much disapproved by the high character
 alluded to, and given reason to surmise, that a
 resignation of his office may not be far distant.
 We trust, however, that an accommodation
 will be effected, and that the present flourish-
 ing state of affairs in this country may not be in-
 terrupted by divisions among ourselves.

COUNTRY NEWS.

Kinfale, Oct. 4. A gentlemanly man who
 was seen on Friday last, riding into this town
 on a brown mare, called upon a widow lady
