bread, occasioned by the great exportation of
corn, and, as is well ascertained, an indifferent
harvest: he remarked, that unless an immedi-
ate stop was put to this evil, in a short time
the entire produce of the industrious manufac-
turer's labour would be insufficient to maintain
a family. It was well known, he said, that
the harvests of other countries had failed in a
greater degree than our own, which had so
encouraged speculation in the article of corn,
that, notwithstanding the bounties granted by
the nation on exportation had ceased, in con-
sequence of the advanced price at home, yet
the merchants continued to export it at their
risque. He observed that it was incumbent on
the Corporation of the city, to take such steps
as would secure the poor of this metropolis
from experiencing such distress as would un-
avoidably ensue if the present great exportation
was not stopped, and concluded with moving,
That a message be sent to the other house,
proposing that a Committee should be formed,
and empowered to make application to Go-
vernment, for a prohibition to the exportation
of corn for a limited time, which was agreed
to, and sent to the Board for their concurrence.

can add nothing to the gratification of his departed spirit,
little to the consolation of his friends, yet operates as a
comfortable example that a life so spent is the best secu-
rity for esteem and affection, the festivity of his temper
forsook him not till the hour of his dissolution, no se-
cond childishness, but vigorous and unimpaired were all
his faculties, and to speak with the moral poet:

"His age was like a luscious winter, frosty but kindly."
In short to be universally admired, he wanted but to be
universally known.
