
His Grace of Leeds is now fpoken of as a favourite object with the Crown, and is faid to be in treaty for the department.

On Monday laft, proceedings in a caufe of confiderable confequence, between Mr Price, plaintiff, and the Corporation of the College of Dublin, defendants, came on to be heard before his Excellency the Lord Chancellor, on the plaintiff's petition, praving leave to traverfe the findings on an inquisition in 1750, whereby certain lands in the county of Wicklow, were found to have been devifed by the laft will and teftament of Dr. Baldwin, formerly Provoft of Trinity College, Dublin, to the Provoft, Fellows and Scholars of faid College-when after very extensive pleadings, and a speech delivered by the Chancellor, replete with found equity and great legal language, his Excellency decreedthat the plaintiff should be at liberty to traverfe.

Same day, the Attorney General, on the part of the Crown, moved for a conditional rule for an attachment to iffue against John Magee, for two publications, of the 15th and 17th of September, in a paper called the Dublin Evening Post, of which the faid John Magee is Proprietor for misrepresenting the proceedings of the Court of King's Bench, and reflecting on the Judge who prefided. Rule granted unless cause in four days.

Mr. John Magee of College-green, was laft Thursday brought up to the Court of King's Bench in order to receive judgment on the information at the fuit of Mr Higgins; when he was remanded to the custody of the Sheriffs, to be again brought up on Tuesday nex', in order to affign error.

Thursday, in the Court of King's Bench, an application was made that the Court would be pleafed to name a day to hear Counfel (on behalf of John Magee) to fet alide a verdict obtained against him on a trial at Nifi Prius, at the fittings after the laft term. The Court objected to hear any motion, until Magee appeared in cultody, and cited feveral cates to prove that to be the rule, when a perfon had been convicted of a mildemeanor. Upon which Mr. Magee's Counfel moved, that their Lordfhips would be pleafed to order the High Sheriffs to bring up Mr. Magee, who was then in their cultody; to this the Court affented, and in a thort time Mr. Magee was brought up, in cuftody of Mr. Sheriff Vance; when, after a variety of learned arguments of Counfel on both fides, the Judges unanimoully rejected the application, as militating against the established and known rules of the Court (Magee having had fufficient time, and not availing himfelf of it); but obferved, that his Counfel might move in arreft of judgment, when, if any errors ap peared on the record or proceedings, the prifoner flould have all the advantages, and siked when the Counfel would be properly prepared, -On Counfel mentioning Tuefday next, the Court ordered Mr. Magee to be remanded by the Sheriffs, and to be brought up on that day. C. apprehended at Toulerton, Mark Reddin, of Manuf more, in the county of Clare, farmer, charged with killing his brother Patrick Reddin, by fracturing his fkull with a pitchfork, on the 2d October, of which he languished till the 10th of faid month .- He was efforted to town by a party of the Spittal Affociation, and committed to the county gaol by Walter Widenham, Efq.
