C O R K, Nov. 16. Extract of a Letter from Paris, Nov. 5.

" The die is cast-the important affair of the Church Lands is at last determined, and numbers have prevailed by a majority of 232 -they must come to the bammer, but for the best of purposes, -the liquidation of the national debt.

" On this occasion, the Archbishop of Aix was the decided champion of the Church, by displaying the most inexhausted fund of national and ecclebaftical history, by the most minute, but fingularly instructing reference to antient deeds, charters, concessions and privileges granted from Charlemagne to the prefent zera. Several illustrious foreigners were prefent at the debates, and so great were his powers, to deliberate, and dignified was his reafoning, that admiration was incessant, and a reverence for his virtues univerfally proclaimed—his opponents were even his warmest panegyriftshe offered three hundred millions in the name of the Church, and twenty millions a month for a limited time-he friends of a Regal Authority, and folendid patronage, heaved many a figh I-but Cataline was at the Gates, and not a moment was to be loit.

"The confequences were obvious-the funds role inflantly above two per cent, and will infallibly take an higher flight-fuch a fecurity to lenders was never offered in any country, and which to the near approaching great advantage of contitutional freedom, must give to France a very decided pre-eminence in the general administration of its foreign and domettic commerce, and in its pub-
