Extract of a Letter from Paris, Nov. 5.

"The die is cast—the important affair of the Church Lands is at last determined, and numbers have prevailed by a majority of 232—they must come to the hammer, but for the best of purposes,—the liquidation of the national debt.

"On this occasion, the Archbishop of Aix was the decided champion of the Church, by displaying the most inexhausted fund of national and ecclesiastical history, by the most minute, but singularly instructing reference to ancient deeds, charters, concessions and privileges granted from Charlemagne to the present era. Several illustrious foreigners were present at the debates, and so great were his powers, so deliberate, and dignified was his reasoning, that admiration was incessant, and a reverence for his virtues universally proclaimed—his opponents were even his warmest panegyrist—he offered three hundred millions in the name of the Church, and twenty millions a month for a limited time—the friends of a Regal Authority, and splendid patronage, heaved many a sigh—but *Cataline was at the Gates*, and not a moment was to be lost.

"The consequences were obvious—the funds rose instantly above two per cent, and will infallibly take an higher flight—such a security to lenders was never offered in any country, and which to the near approaching great advantage of constitutional freedom, must give to France a very decided pre-eminence in the general administration of its foreign and domestic commerce, and in its public and private resources."
