He was followed by Mr Arthur Browne, who stated that the iffue in this case was joined on the 13th of June, and that the tell of the writ of Venire was dated the 12 h of June; this, he laid, was, in the first instance, a faral objection; the Venire, he faid, could not have been awarded till the iffue had been joined, and the writ is antecedent to the joining of the iffue, whereas it should have been subsequent. The trial, therefore, was a mil trial, the lury not being duly authorifed to try. The f-cond objection was, the award of the writ of Venire fays to come on on Tuesday next, after three weeks from the Holy Trinity. The test of the writ is the 12th of June, and the feast of the Holy Trinity was on the 7th, which was hee days previous to the illuing the writ. Mr. Browne made many other ftrong objections, and in support of his arguments, cited a great number of cases, and dwelt on each for some time, and deduced inferences from them fayourable to his client.

Mr. Hacker, on the same lide, said, that with the indulgence of the Court, he should referve himfelf for a reply to whatever arguments might be offered on the part of the profecution.

Mr. Calbeck, for the profecution, answered the objections made by Mr. Sheridan; he faid they were frivolous and futile, and fuch as

could be by no means supported. Mr. Walker, on behalf of Mr. Magee, in a fpeech of fome length and uncommon animation, infilled that there were errors on the face of the record fufficiently strong for arresting the judgment.

It being then a quarter past three o'clock, the hearing of further arguments in this very interesting cause, was adjourned to 11 o'clock on Friday, and priven serve

Friday the pleadings in the above cause were continued. Counsellor Keller argued in behalf of the arreft, and was replied to in a forech replete with eloquence and argument by Counfellor Corran. The pleadings having latted until near three o'clock in the afternoon, the Court adjourned the bufiness until Thursday.

Thursday Mr. Magee was brought up to the Court of King's Bench, when he was admitted to bail in his own recognizance, until the opinion of the Judges should be known.

Notwithstanding the machinations and invidious reports circulated to prejudice the minds of the public, by the enemies of Mr. Magee, he on Thursday last gained a complete victory over the Sham, by the discovery of some errors in the record, by which judgment could not be paffed upon him, and of courfe that bufiness has fallen to the ground.

Yesterday during the proceedings against Mr. Magee in the Court of King's Bench; fome practices were discovered which must cast an indelible stigma on the persons concerned; it is no less than altering the dates of the Records of the Court, respecting a late Trial; when a certain Counfellor was examined touching this ugly affair --- he feemed to prevaricate very much and from the complexion of the bufinels it is strongly suspected that the parties concerned are in a perilous fituation.

When Mr. Magee was discharged out of Court, as foon as he got into High-fireet, be was taken into cuttody by the Sheriffs on diflerent Fiats.
