When the congratulatory address from the  
 evolution Society, in Eng<sup>l</sup>, to the National  
 Assembly of France, was read: the Duke de  
 lancourt moved, that a lei of thanks should

 the Society. This was unanously agreed to.

Neither a thicker, nor more offensive fog  
 than that of last night is fufed to have been  
 witnessed by the oldest inhabitant of London or  
 its vicinities. Several of the stages travelling  
 between the metropolis and the surrounding  
 villages were, by five in the afternoon, prece-  
 ded by men with torches and thorns; others  
 were quitted by the passeng, who walked to  
 their respective homes, and horses of many  
 were led at a very slow pacy people on foot.  
 Some persons who were boats upon the  
 Thames, and whose return as expected yef-  
 terday, had not been heard this morning.—  
 It is feared that, through the excessive obscru-  
 ty of the evening and nig, many accidents  
 have happened both by land and water.

The Duke of Clarence confined to his  
 chamber with a bilious fer, which this au-  
 tumn seems to be a very preient disorder:

Wednesday eight prisone were tried at the  
 Old Bailey for making a revolt on board the  
 regon, Capt. W. Corraat Dick's Cove,  
 about a league and a half on the Coast of  
 Africa. On account of the of their com-  
 edes being confined in iron or msh haviour,  
 they armed themselves, to the number of about  
 20, with marling-spikes, har-spikes, and iron  
 hoops straightened to serve instead of cutlasses,  
 and insisted upon releasing the three culprits;  
 which the Captain opposing they threatened  
 them, and all who did not join them, with de-  
 duction; upon which he feared himself be-  
 hind a barrier, which was paly erected across  
 the vessel for the purpose of separating the  
 ariners from the slaves at the time when they  
 were admitted to come upon deck for air, &c.  
 and sent to shore for a guard who having fired  
 and killed three of them, the rest surrendered,  
 and were secured, in order for their trials as  
 above mentioned; when two were admitted as  
 witnesses against the rest; two of whom, viz.  
 John Williams and Hugh Wilson, were capi-  
 tally convicted, and six were acquitted. Ten  
 other prisoners were delivered by proclamation  
 the same day, for want of prosecution.

Their Majesties, the Princess Royal, Prin-  
 cess Augusta, and Princess Elizabeth, again ho-

 voluntary impulse of loyalty to the best of So-  
 veraigns, and affection for the best of men.

infamy.—For, had I written to the Com-  
 missary of Quarantine at Cork, and have ob-  
 tained his evidence, the black complexion of  
 the cause would have been still more obvious.  
 But the expences which I have been subjct to,  
 prevented me from taking that step, and like-  
 wise prevented me from anticipating or reliev-  
 ing the wants of an aged and much honoured

 but for the humane and generous interposi-  
 tion of his Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence, I  
 must have sunk under the burthen. The gra-  
 titude that I owe to that most excellent Prince,  
 I cannot at present express in language ade-  
 quate to the occasion.

"The anguish that I felt at the danger the  
 ship was in from its leaky situation, and the  
 slothfulness of the crew, obliged me to commit  
 violence to my feelings, by commanding and  
 enforcing strict discipline, in order to prevent  
 that despair which was visibly encreasing upon  
 the crew. On this account I was sometimes  
 obliged to act in repugnance to my feelings. I  
 utterly deny having intentionally injured the  
 carpenter; for it cannot be supposed that I  
 could wish to rid myself of his assistance in the  
 situation in which the ship at that time was.  
 The reason of my ordering the carpenter upon  
 deck was, through the medium of Mr. Jenkins,  
 in order to make him clean the bats, that him-  
 self, as well as the crew, might not suffer by  
 the stench: I do not wonder at the prosecutors  
 giving this aspect to the charge, as they have  
 taken every opportunity of traducing my cha-  
 racter.

"The horror I feel in the fullest extent, as  
 standing in this situation and place before so  
 awful a Court, can only be relieved by a firm  
 persuasion that this august Tribunal will judge  
 of my cause as it deserves; and that you,  
 Gentlemen of the Jury (bowing) shall give  
 your verdict with wonted candour, discrimina-  
 tion, and justice."

Stephen Webber, a Pilot, affirmed, that as he
