After her death several thousand pounds worth of Bank of England notes were found in her lodgings; yet tho' possessed of this wealth, her appearance bespoke great poverty; and in the severest weather it was her custom to sit in the open street, with a few lemons and nuts for sale to passengers.

In consequence of the Countess of Westmorland having lately miscarried, it is apprehended that she will not accompany the Chief Governor to Ireland.

Lord Massarene has set seriously to work, since his arrival in this country, in order to recover and arrange his property, which is said to have suffered considerably since his absence. Notwithstanding twenty years immurement, his Lordship looks well, and is in full health and spirits.

A letter from a merchant in Birmingham, to a reputable citizen in this metropolis, mentions that the trade of that town, as well as of Sheffield, has suffered considerably since the breaking out of the troubles in France; and that
