Guernsey; in both of which the standard of  
liberty is erected. The points resolved upon  
are Trials by Juries, and an  
Appeal and Jurisdiction.

Island of Jersey takes the lead in the  
patriotic reformation; and as soon as  
the resolutions were carried, a commu-  
nication thereof, and an invitation, was im-  
mediately transmitted to Guernsey, where the  
sentiment was much stronger and more nu-  
merous, but where, however, the rights of  
the subjects at length prevailed.

Health of the venerable Earl of Mans-  
field continued with little variation for some  
time past. His Lordship's physicians are of  
opinion that unless some material alterations  
be made, his life may be prolonged for seve-

ral years. It is now some idea entertained, that  
the Earl will be suffered to arrive in  
England before a successor will be appointed.  
The Council in Bengal is a much re-  
served character, and therefore such a measure  
is not likely to be attended with much incon-  
venience—it will besides serve to prevent bick-  
ering animosities for the present among our  
great.

Irish Patriotism have ventured to  
bring soldiers, part of the Emperor's gar-  
ment, to a public trial, for plundering  
and committing acts of cruelty du-  
ring their march; the men were con-  
demned to die; and should the Emperor retain  
his, they hold 1200 prisoners, and  
hang man for man. It is hoped the  
negotiation will prevent the necessity  
of going to measures, frightful even in  
their own nature.

The Literati will be delighted to hear, that

has now in his possession a manuscript of that

Yesterday morning all the domestics of his  
Excellency the Earl of Westmoreland, except  
those who immediately attend his person dur-  
ing his journey from London, landed here from  
Holyhead.

By the death of Henry Meredith, Esq. of

There never was a more open and notorious  
abuse of justice, than by the Captain, who had  
the transportation of Patrick Fay and numerous  
other convicts. He had not passed the Irish  
Channel, before he liberated and delivered Fay  
to a coal-ship bound to Whitehaven, at which  
place Fay landed, and appeared publicly for  
several days. From Whitehaven, he sailed for  
Bordeaux, where he now resides, and in which  
city he actually keeps, at present, a cheese-  
monger's and earthenware shop.

Though Fay, before his leaving Ireland, gave  
a Letter of Attorney to two friends, to receive  
his rents in this kingdom, yet the tenants in ge-  
neral refuse to pay, in consequence, it is said,  
of being advised by an eminent Counsellor, that  
Fay, not having conformed to the law, by not  
being transported, according to his sentence,  
to his Majesty's plantations abroad, cannot give  
a legal Letter of Attorney.

a verdict, Not Guilty.—Miss Egan fainted  
several times in the course of her examination;
