HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

THE Lord Bishop of Limerick has been pleased to fix SUNDAY the 17th January 1790, for CHARITY SERMONS to be preached in the Churches of Limerick to aid the United House of Industry for the County and City of Limerick.

Since the Year 1774 Two Thousand One Hundred and Ninety-five have been received into the House, where there are now 97 Poor, many of whom must have perished by Sickness and extreme Want. The Governors have adopted every saving Plan, and the Poor are maintained for about two-pence-farthing each, per Day. The Balance in Hands will not support the House until next Assizes, and as the Poor are mostly Natives of the County, it is requested such Country Gentlemen as cannot attend the Sermons, will send their Contributions to Mr. FERRAR, in Limerick.—The Governors with every humane Person would visit the House and see how it is managed.
