Mr. GORTON presented a petition

the House will on Monday next take into con-
sideration, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's

proper officers to lay before this House, the pub-
lic accounts of the nation, and the several esta-

That an humble address be presented to

blishments and other charges of government,
beginning the 25th of March 1790,
ending the 25th of September following;
a military list from the 31st of March 1790,
to the 31st of October following, together with

rer during the said times, and the arrears re-
maining undischarged; together with the state of
the revenue, and the charges of management,
together with her deductions, from the 25th of March
to the 25th of September following;
which were severally agreed to.

Ordered, that the said Addresses be present-
ed to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant by
each Member of this House as are of his Ma-
jesty's most honourable Privy Council.

The Right Hon. Mr. Secretary Hobart in-
formed the House, that their addresses for lay-
ing before the House the public accounts of
the nation, and the several establishments, ci-
vil and military, had been presented to his Ex-
cellency the Lord Lieutenant, and that his Ex-
cellency had given directions accordingly.

The Right Hon. Mr. Clements, by order

His desire was that the plans of reform
